CMAC will discuss potential regional approaches for assessing microtransit projects within the region's priority ranking process for the upcoming biennium. Microtransit is flexible, on-demand transportation operated by transit agencies. At the meeting, staff will share background information, including results from previous cycles in which several transit agencies submitted microtransit projects. Then, the committee will discuss the regional approach to assess the microtransit project request for the upcoming regional priority ranking process.

- 4. Discussion Item: Regional Priority Ranking Process – Vehicle Replacement Projects (10:20 a.m.)* – Jean Kim & Kellee Harwood, PSRC**

PSRC staff will continue facilitating a discussion on the regional priority ranking process, with a focus on vehicle replacement projects. At the November debrief, CMAC expressed interest in further examining the assessment methodology for vehicle replacement requests and better aligning these projects with associated service expansion (operations) requests. While current state guidance requires sponsors to submit separate applications for vehicle and service expansion requests, staff will share key findings from recent funding cycles and outline potential next steps to support the committee's discussion.

INTRODUCTIONS AND ANNOUNCEMENTS

Jean Kim, PSRC, welcomed everyone at 9:30 a.m. and took a roll call of the membership in attendance.

APPROVAL OF MEETING SUMMARY OR REPORTS

The November 19, 2025 meeting summary was approved as presented.

DISCUSSION ITEM: PREPARATION FOR THE REGIONAL PRIORITY RANKING PROCESS

Jean Kim, PSRC, provided an overview of PSRC's Regional Priority Ranking process, which is the regional process for the WSDOT's Consolidated Grant competition. Based on the debrief held in November, Jean shared upcoming topics to discuss with CMAC before this year's process for the 2027-2029 biennium. Key topics include the review and revision of Equitable Engagement factor, performance measures, especially for vehicle replacement applications, and project types (for example, microtransit). She shared a draft schedule for 2026, which include regional process training on July 15, sponsor presentation on October 21, and CMAC deliberation to develop a recommendation on November 18.

DISCUSSION ITEM: EQUITABLE ENGAGEMENT AND COMMUNICATIONS FACTOR

Erin Hogan, PSRC, facilitated the discussion to refine the Equitable Engagement and Communications Factor that PSRC uses for assessment. This factor assesses how well the project was shaped by the priority communities it serves and how effectively it communicates with community members to make improvements. Erin shared sample

responses received as part of the past grant cycle and the results of the regional evaluation. While there's a need for clearer guidance, expectations, and examples to help sponsors, PSRC is also working on how equitable engagement is addressed in other funding evaluation criteria. Some of the recommendations from this broader agency's work will be incorporated for the upcoming biennium. CMAC asked questions and provided feedback.

Subject: Regional Priority Ranking Process – Microtransit

IN BRIEF

PSRC will facilitate CMAC discussion on the approach to assess regional priority for microtransit projects for the Consolidated Grant competition.

BACKGROUND

WSDOT awards state and federal funds to specialized transportation services through the Consolidated Grant program every two years. Specialized transportation serves older adults, individuals with disabilities, and other individuals with mobility and accessibility needs when public transit is unavailable or does not meet their needs. Regional planning organizations across the state, like PSRC, contribute to this process by providing an A-D ranking for each project to help the state fund the projects that best align with each region's priorities. WSDOT uses these rankings as part of its overall scoring process for the Consolidated Grant program.

PSRC assesses project applications using the Regional Priority Ranking Factors as part of the initial application review. The results of this review inform CMAC's deliberations during the priority ranking process. Before or during deliberations, CMAC may also develop a set of considerations to use as a rationale for adjusting the initial PSRC assessment results when allocating rankings. These are called the Additional Considerations for Deliberations and cannot be similar to or duplicative of the Regional Priority Ranking Factors already used for the initial staff assessment.

As part of the 2027-2029 process preparation, PSRC is facilitating potential refinements to the Regional Priority Ranking Factors and additional deliberation considerations.

DISCUSSION

In recent grant cycles, PSRC has received an increasing number of project applications requesting funding for microtransit services. Microtransit refers to flexible, on-demand

transportation operated by transit agencies that supplements fixed-route transit and is typically provided in areas or times with limited transit service.

During the 2025-2027 biennium, three microtransit project requests were submitted and CMAC allocated D rankings to all. Two Pierce Transit projects were awarded funding to sustain existing service and expand service to underserved areas. The City of Issaquah submitted one application but was not funded. While WSDOT makes final eligibility determinations, PSRC's role in establishing a clear regional consensus on whether or not to prioritize microtransit would help inform the upcoming process.

The goal of this item is to gather CMAC input on whether and how microtransit projects should be considered within the regional process for the Consolidated Grant program. Potential discussion questions include:

Should microtransit projects be prioritized in the regional ranking process? If so, why? If not, why?

If prioritized, under what circumstances and based on what project characteristics (e.g., serving priority populations, providing service in areas with limited transit)?

If deprioritized, what implications could this have for ongoing microtransit operations in existing service areas, and how might this decision affect priority populations?

If time allows, the committee will discuss potential next steps, whether to add a new Regional Priority Ranking Factor or refine an existing factor used in the PSRC assessment. Another option is to add a new deliberation consideration for CMAC's discussion during the deliberation meeting to adjust the initial review results.

NEXT STEPS

PSRC will initiate this discussion at the February meeting and develop a staff proposal (or options) in March that reflects the committee's input on how microtransit projects should be evaluated in the upcoming priority ranking process.

It will be important to have a decision on this topic prior to the call for projects for the upcoming regional priority ranking process, which is tentatively scheduled to be released in early summer.

Subject: **Regional Priority Ranking Process – Vehicle Replacement Projects**

IN BRIEF

At the meeting, CMAC will discuss how the region will assess and prioritize vehicle replacement projects submitted through the Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT)'s Consolidated Grant Program for the upcoming biennium.

BACKGROUND

PSRC received an unusually high number of vehicle replacement project applications during the 2025-2027 grant cycle. During this cycle, all six vehicle replacement applications received a D ranking from PSRC. WSDOT awarded funding to two of these projects. PSRC received no capital project applications during the 2023-2025 cycle. Based on recent grant cycles, applicants commonly request replacement vehicles for the operation of existing or expanded services.

DISCUSSION

At the November 2025 Regional Priority Ranking Process Debrief, CMAC expressed interest in further examining the assessment methodology for vehicle replacement requests.

During the 2025-2027 biennium, the PSRC region evaluated projects based on whether they addressed the required performance metrics across a range of project types, applying the Performance Measures and Targets Factor, which is one of the five Regional Priority Ranking Factors used in the PSRC evaluation. While regional guidance provided specific metrics for capital projects (e.g., remaining Useful Life Benchmark), there was limited guidance or follow-up analysis to distinguish and prioritize the unique needs of each replacement request.

At the February meeting, CMAC will have the opportunity to discuss potential next steps for identifying information and metrics, derived from WSDOT applications, that could be

used to help prioritize vehicle replacement projects. To support this discussion, PSRC identified relevant elements from existing application:

- Vehicle description
- Maximum vehicle capacity
- Cost
- Vehicle type
- Year
- Make/Model
- Fuel type
- Remaining useful life (Useful Life Benchmark or ULB)
- Current status (i.e., active or spare)
- Current mileage
- Whether the vehicle is requested to support a different grant application
- Whether or not the project is scalable
- Whether or not the vehicle will be ADA accessible

If time allows, the committee will also discuss how to better align vehicle replacement project applications with associated service expansion requests. While current state guidance requires sponsors to submit separate applications for vehicle and service expansion requests and allocate rankings for each individual request, CMAC has noted that these projects are often interdependent and may benefit from being considered together during the regional priority ranking process.

NEXT STEPS

PSRC will initiate this discussion at the February meeting and use feedback from the discussion to develop one or more options for the committee to consider in March. It will be important to have a decision on this topic before the call for projects for the upcoming regional priority ranking process, which is tentatively scheduled to be released in early summer.
