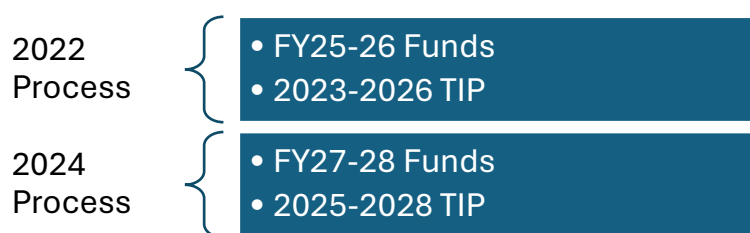

PREPARING FOR THE 2027 PROJECT SELECTION PROCESS

Historically, PSRC conducts a competitive project selection process every two years for the distribution of PSRC's federal funds. Funds are programmed in advance and the cycles timed to ensure compliance with federal and state rules for a fully programmed 4-year Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). For example, the 2024 project selection process distributed FY27-28 funds and led to the development of the 2025-2028 Regional TIP (see illustrative graphic below).



The next project selection process was postponed until 2027, to allow staff time to conduct a review of the process for alignment with current federal and state direction. This work began in early 2026 and included collaboration with PSRC's Equity Advisory Committee (EAC). Staff worked with the EAC over a three-month period and co-created a new Opportunity Index tool. This tool will support the assessment of transportation projects in addressing the needs of underserved communities. In addition, the Regional Transportation Plan was adopted in May 2026 and calls for the Regional Safety Action Plan and the Active Transportation Plan to inform the next project selection process.

The topics identified above were discussed at the June and August RPEC meetings, and additional background information was provided. The draft approach for updates to the project evaluation criteria was reviewed, as described on the following page.

Based on questions received to date, a few **important reminders:**

- The overarching policy framework of support for centers and the corridors that serve them is still the anchor for the project selection process. All of the project evaluation criteria build from this anchor framework, consistent with all previous processes.
- Unless there is further board direction, the criteria and the process are structurally the same as previous processes – the criteria are being refined to address the three topic areas but are not being substantially altered.

The following is a high-level description of how the three areas will inform the project evaluation criteria.

- **Safety** – Among other factors, applicants will describe the safety issue being addressed by the project and identify if the project is located on a facility on the regional, state, or a local high injury network.
- **Active transportation criteria** – Pedestrian and bicycle components are addressed in several ways in the criteria, including mobility and safety. Among other factors, the type of improvement in relation to the speed and volume of the roadway facility per the [Pedestrian / Bicycle Facility Typology](#) will be considered, as will a facility's location on a pedestrian / bicycle high injury network.
- **Aligning with current federal guidance** – The Opportunity Index will be addressed within each criterion, evaluating how well projects address needs and improve the quality of life for residents living in areas of Low or Lowest Opportunity. The approach utilizes the existing criterion addressing benefits to underserved populations, using the Opportunity Index rather than demographic data. Within each criterion, points will be awarded if the project demonstrates support of an area of Low or Lowest Opportunity in an individual category Index, but higher points will be awarded for demonstrating support of an area of Low or Lowest Opportunity in the Combined Index.

Background: As a reminder, a series of specific indicators was used to develop the Opportunity Index within four categories: Transportation, Amenities, Housing and Economy. [Maps](#) have been created illustrating areas of Opportunity from Low to High for each category, as well as for the aggregate across all four categories. Projects will not be evaluated against individual indicators. The indicators were used to determine the areas of Low / Lowest Opportunity (i.e., locations in the region where there is limited access to resources and needs are the greatest). As noted above, projects will be evaluated using the existing criteria and a demonstration of how the project benefits residents living within one of these areas.

Staff is working on specific guidance language and examples and will provide this information as it is developed. Further discussion and Q&A will occur over the next several RPEC meetings.

Future Cycles

RPEC will also be asked to provide feedback on the planning for future processes to realign back to a regular 2-year cycle while maintaining the requirement for a fully programmed 4-year TIP. This issue has been addressed in past cycles, with the key considerations being the number of funding years to include in each process as well as the timing of the upcoming cycles.

Staff will provide additional information and options for discussion at the upcoming RPEC meetings.
