CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 10:02 a.m. by Chair Bader.

COMMUNICATIONS AND PUBLIC COMMENT

No public comments were received.

CHAIR'S REPORT

Chair Bader welcomed Valerie Smith, Washington State Department of Commerce's Growth Management Division's Interim Deputy Managing Director, who presented the board with the 2020-2021 Governor's Smart Communities Awards for the VISION 2050 plan. VISION 2050 was honored with a Judges' Merit Award.

Chair Bader recognized that November is Indigenous Peoples Heritage Month.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Director of Growth Management Paul Inghram pointed out the two information items in the agenda packet. The Puget Sound Action Agenda Development and Workshops item provides more information on the work of the Puget Sound Partnership and the 2022 GMPB calendar was provided.

COORDINATION WITH TRIBES IN COMPREHENSIVE PLANNING

Senior Planner Erika Harris provided information on guidance for coordination with Tribes in the upcoming comprehensive plan process. Ms. Harris shared that PSRC has updated the <u>Tribal Nations webpage</u> to provide more resources to local jurisdictions and provided examples of jurisdictions coordinating with tribes. Boardmember Andrew Strobel representing the Puyallup Tribe of Indians shared his appreciation for the work staff has done to provide more resources for local jurisdictions to coordinate with Tribes and emphasized the importance of understanding treaty rights during the planning process.

REGIONAL TRANSIT-ORIENTED DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE UPDATE

Senior Planner Laura Benjamin reviewed initial work of the re-launched Regional Transit-Oriented Development Committee including the October 8 TOD event that included a webinar and walking tours. Ms. Benjamin reviewed the committee's 2022 draft work plan. The committee will adopt the draft work plan at its December 3 meeting. The board will receive periodic updates on the committee at future meetings.

COMPREHENSIVE PLAN GUIDANCE

Principal Planner Liz Underwood-Bultmann presented on comprehensive plan guidance. Ms. Underwood-Bultmann provided an overview of new or expanded focus areas in VISION 2050. PSRC is providing resources to help support local jurisdictions through the comprehensive planning process including workshops, planning guidance, one-on-one technical guidance, and an updated planning resources webpage.

Subject: 2022 Legislative Overview

IN BRIEF

The managing director for the Washington Department of Commerce's Growth Management Services and Growth Management Policy Board member David Andersen will provide the board with a preview of the 2022 legislative session and anticipated growth management related bills.

DISCUSSION

The Washington State Legislature will convene its session in early January. Each year, the Legislature considers bills related to the Growth Management Act and local and regional planning. Commerce's Growth Management Services team tracks bills related to the Growth Management Act. At the January board meeting, Mr. Andersen will provide an overview of key topics under discussion. This includes bills related to housing, climate, and environmental provisions of the Growth Management Act.

Several legislative issues were identified in the VISION 2050 plan. PSRC coordinates with state and local governments to support work on legislative initiatives. Local governments and others may use VISION 2050 as a resource in their own legislative work.

NEXT STEPS

Staff will track relevant GMA bills and may report back to the board on legislation related to the priorities outlined in VISION 2050.

Subject: Industrial Lands Analysis Update

IN BRIEF

VISION 2050 directs PSRC to update the inventory of industrial lands and to research changing conditions related to industrial uses. Staff seek board direction on the scope of the industrial lands update, which will also be coordinated with the Economic Development District Board and PSRC's Freight Advisory Committee.

DISCUSSION

Industrial lands are a critical component of the region's landscape. Historic industries such as trade, maritime, aerospace, and manufacturing have long defined the region's economy. Industrial uses remain a key element of the region's economy and are a source of thousands of well-paying jobs. These industries, and their related supply chains, are dependent on the region's supply of industrial lands.

During the development of VISION 2050, PSRC's leaders recognized the importance of maintaining industrial uses and included policies that direct the protection of industrial lands from encroachment by incompatible uses. Additionally, the region's Economic Development District Board adopted a new Regional Economic Strategy in December 2021. This strategy affirms the importance of industrial lands to the region's economy and calls for the region to preserve, protect, and support ports, industrial lands, military installations, and maritime sites.

DP-Action-2 in VISION 2050 specially calls for an update of the industrial lands inventory:

DP-Action-2 Industrial Lands: PSRC will update its inventory of industrial lands, evaluate supply and demand for industrial land across all industry sectors, research trends for industrial uses as technology and markets evolve, and identify strategies to preserve, protect, and enhance industrial lands, jobs, and businesses in the region in coordination with jurisdictions' efforts to support their industrial land base. In 2021, PSRC will convene a working group to review policy related to preserving industrial lands and employment.

2015 Industrial Lands Report

In 2015, PSRC published an <u>Industrial Lands Analysis</u> that provides an assessment of the major industrial lands in the region. The report provides an inventory of a net supply of 28,615 acres of industrial lands that are primarily located in thirteen geographic concentrations across the region (See Exhibit E.1 from the report). The assessment demonstrated sufficient supply of industrial lands through 2040 but observed that demand, development pressures, and activities on these lands varied by subarea and that tailored strategies would be required to support the industrial land base in the future. These areas of intense manufacturing and industrial uses often require unique and fundamental infrastructure, such as deep-water port access and rail connections, enhancing the importance of their preservation. For these reasons, VISION 2050 calls for the region to protect industrial lands and to provide the infrastructure and services necessary to support them.

The number of jobs on industrial lands totaled 473,700 in 2012, representing about 27.3% of all jobs across the central Puget Sound region. The report found that, in 2012, total wages paid out by industrial activities on industrial lands summed to \$24.4 billion and that average wages were significantly higher than the region's average wage.




Exhibit E.1. Industrial Subareas of the Central Puget Sound Region

Project Scoping

VISION 2050's DP-Action-2 directs PSRC to update the inventory of industrial lands with the guidance of a project working group. The Growth Management Policy Board, Economic Development District Board, and Freight Advisory Committee, each with unique roles related to industrial lands, will be asked to provide guidance on the project and to help define the scope of analysis.

While the general inventory of industrial lands has not changed dramatically in the region since the report was published, new issues have emerged.

 Last mile delivery and package distribution have grown rapidly with changing spending habits and a growing regional population.

- Changes to state sales tax collection continue to shape the financial incentives for local jurisdictions to support and maintain industrial spaces.
- Pressure to convert industrial lands for non-manufacturing uses continues to rise.
- There is an increased awareness of the value of manufacturing jobs to increase access to opportunity.

Additionally, PSRC adopted the Regional Centers Framework in 2018, which incorporated findings from the industrial land analysis. Implementation of the Framework has raised additional questions on how terms and concepts are defined. Since the Industrial Lands Analysis was published in 2015, PSRC designated two additional Manufacturing/Industrial Centers as regional concentrations of industrial employment: the Sumner/Pacific MIC and the Cascade MIC that includes Arlington and Marysville. To be designated an MIC requires the center to include and maintain predominantly industrial lands, have a majority of industrial employment, and to prioritize funding for transportation projects that serve them.

The board is asked for feedback on early scoping of the industrial lands update:

- What are trends and changes impacting industrial lands that this report update might consider?
- What are ways that an update to the industrial lands analysis might be useful for your community?
- How could the industrial lands analysis help the region improve equitable access to employment?

PSRC plans to update the report using available GIS data and in-house research over the course of the year. Data collection, mapping updates, and initial interviews of stakeholders will be conducted in the spring. A draft report may be prepared in the late summer with a goal of completing the report late in 2022. Completing the update at this time will be useful for cities and counties as they begin work on local plan updates.

Engagement

The intent is to work with the Growth Management Policy Board, Economic Development District Board, and Freight Advisory Committee to provide project and policy direction and to review the draft analysis as it is developed. In addition to an initial project discussion with the boards and committee, PSRC is reaching out to cities, counties, ports, and other stakeholders to seek input on how the report could be updated and may be used. Consistent with DP-Action-2, staff anticipates organizing an ad hoc working group of technical staff to provide peer review of data and analysis. Please let us know if there are staff in your community that you would like us to connect with.

NEXT STEPS


In addition to this briefing, staff will brief the Economic Development District Board on February 2 and the Freight Advisory Committee on February 9.

Staff will begin collecting updated industrial lands data and it is anticipated that staff will be able to share a data snapshot in late spring/early summer. Review of a draft report is likely to occur in late summer/early fall.

Subject: Draft Supplemental Biennial Budget and Work Program (FY2022-2023)

IN BRIEF

Information is provided to the Growth Management Policy Board regarding the Draft Supplemental Biennial Budget and Work Program FY2022-2023.

DISCUSSION

PSRC's Biennial Budget and Work Program was adopted in April 2021 and covers July 1, 2021, through June 30, 2023.

The proposed supplemental budget reflects revenues and expenditure of \$32,016,000, including approximately \$1.8 million in increased carryover grants from the previous biennium that have been added since adoption in April 2021. As a reminder, grants are awarded on a reimbursement basis and are earned only after completion of the work. A full draft budget is available online at https://www.psrc.org/about/budget.

Throughout the month of January, the draft supplemental budget information will be provided to PSRC boards and committees, including the Executive Board, Economic Development District Board, Growth Management Policy Board, Transportation Policy Board, and the Regional Staff Committee. PSRC staff will bring any comments received to the February 24 meeting of the Operations Committee. In March, the Operations Committee will be asked to recommend approval of the budget by the Executive Board. In April, the Executive Board will recommend the budget for adoption by the General Assembly, to be held May 26, 2022.
