Research Purpose

- Measure residents' attitudes and opinions about growth and growth-related issues to help inform VISION 2050.
- Provide scientifically-valid responses that reflect the diversity of opinions in the central Puget Sound region, with enough responses to measure opinion of population subsets.

Research Methodology

- Non-probability study of regional residents (King, Kitsap, Pierce, Snohomish)
- Surveyed 2,000 residents ages 18 and older
 - > Sample: online panels, RDD landline and cell phone sample
 - Mode: Mixed (online and phone, 40% cell)
 - Survey length: 15-min. online, 23-min. phone. Mostly closed-ended
 - Languages offered: English, Spanish and Chinese (targeted Spanish and Chinese-speaking households)
 - > Fielded: March 6 to 25, 2018
 - Sponsor: PSRC (not disclosed)
 - Weighted by age and gender to reflect regional demographics

Key Findings

- A majority (65%) feel the quality of life in the region is positive.
- Cost of living (29%), homelessness (12%) and traffic (10%) are seen as the worst things about the region—a significant change since 2003 when traffic congestion/lack of transportation options (52%) topped the list.
- Change and growth is equally seen as positive (24%) and negative (24%) for residents.
 - Residents who are older, and those who have lived in this region longer are more negative about growth. Residents who moved here more recently and younger respondents are more positive.
- Increasing housing choices (77%) and preserving the natural environment (75%) are seen as important for the region.
- Nearly half (47%) feel the region should be a leader in reducing greenhouse gas emissions.

GENERAL OPINION/QUALITY OF LIFE




Most residents (65%) rate the quality of life in central Puget Sound positively.



Q14 - What do you like <u>best</u> about living in the central Puget Sound region?




There are some significant differences by county


The region's cost of living, homelessness and transportation are top dislikes.

Q15 - What do you like <u>least</u> about living in the central Puget Sound region?




Most responses differ significantly by county.

Q14. What do you like least about living in the central Puget Sound region? (Top 3 Responses in 2018)





Lower cost of living, less traffic and more affordable housing are the top changes desired.


Q16 - What one change would you most like to see happen in the central Puget Sound region over the next 25 years?



Changes desired have also shifted significantly. Cost of living and affordable housing are newer concerns.


Q16. What one change would you most like to see happen in the central Puget Sound region over the next 25 years?

(Top 4 Responses in 2018)





Nearly 6 in 10 say it's difficult or very difficult to access affordable housing in the region.








GROWTH & DEVELOPMENT


Residents are positive about jobs/economic growth and frustrated with traffic and affordability. Infrastructure seen as a positive and a negative.


Most rate current planning for growth and development, 'average.'

Q29 - How would you rate the community where you live when it comes to planning for growth and development?




Regionally, 42% say the region is on the wrong track when it comes to planning for the future.





Even the 'less important' activities were viewed by the majority as important or very important.



Q43 - What's your most important consideration in deciding where to live in the central Puget Sound region?




Cost/price continues to be a top decision driver. Mentions of other factors have declined.

Addressing housing affordability is important, throughout the region.





18-34 year olds were significantly more likely than those 65 and older to say development outside of urban areas, near highways would be better for affordability (30% vs. 20%, respectively)



GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS




47% say it's important or very important to be a leader in reducing greenhouse gas emissions.

Preserving green and open space, investing in infrastructure and smart growth are the most popular GHG reduction policies.








County and Area

2. In what county do you live? (Select one.)






Q10 - What is your current gender identity?







Q57 - What was your gross household income before taxes in 2017?




Q58 - Which is the highest level of education you have completed?




Employment and Commute

Q55 - Which of the following best describes your employment situation?




Q56 - On a normal day, how do you get to your workplace or school? (Those who work or are students n=1,122)


