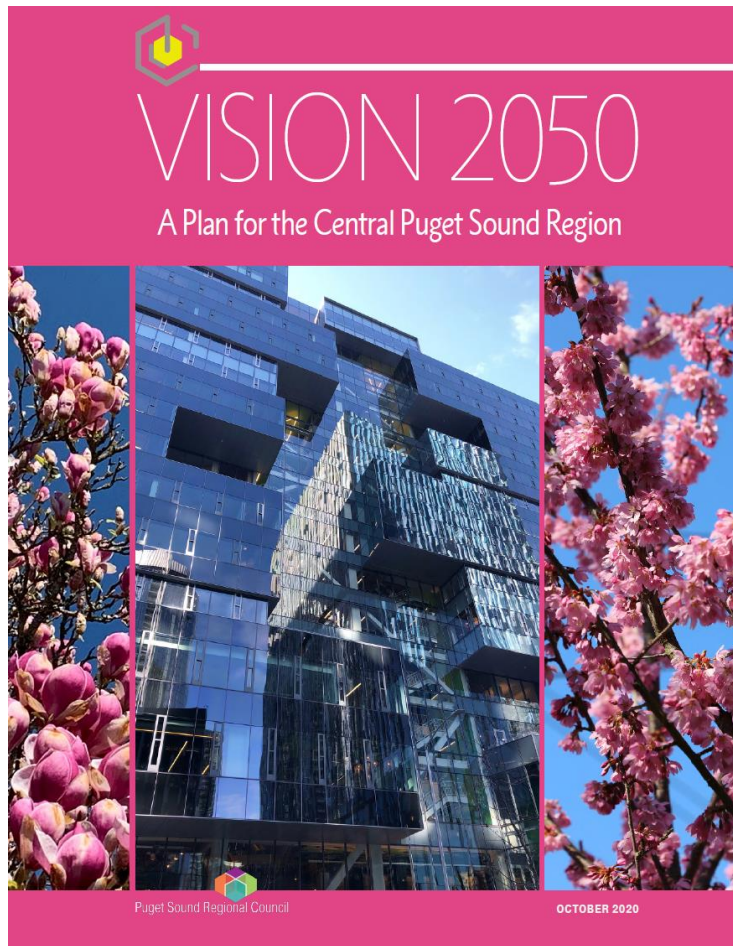

This tool is intended to help cities and counties integrate VISION 2050 into their local comprehensive plans. VISION 2050's multicounty planning policies serve as the adopted regional guidelines and principles required in state law to guide both regional and local planning. The tool also identifies transportation planning requirements of the Growth Management Act (GMA). The tool may be used at various times in the local planning process:

- Plan Update Scoping:** Use checklist items as guidance for scoping the extent of plan element updates. New or expanded issue areas in VISION 2050 are identified to support this process.

## Plan Review Handout

### Plan Review and Certification Program

**Implementing VISION 2050 Through Local Planning**

Long-range plans and policies are developed by the region's counties, cities, countywide planning groups, and transit agencies to help shape communities and plan for growth. PSRC reviews local plans for consistency with state law, VISION 2050, and the Regional Transportation Plan.

State law requires PSRC to review and certify countywide planning policies, local comprehensive plans, and Sound Transit's long-range plan. PSRC also certifies regional center plans and provides comments on local transit plans.

PSRC's plan review includes topics such as mobility, emissions, regional growth, housing, and intergovernmental coordination. Compared to the previous regional plan, VISION 2050 provides new and additional focus on several issues, including housing affordability, climate change, racial equity, coordination with Tribal Nations and other stakeholders, and planning for high-capacity transit.

**Types of Review**

- Countywide Planning Policies
- Local Comprehensive Plans
- Regional Center Plans
- Long-Range Transit Plans

**Why certification?**

- Regional Collaboration:** Challenges such as climate change, housing affordability, congestion, and racial disparities require regional coordination. PSRC's review and certification of local plans and policies supports local governments and public agencies in addressing regional issues.
- Requirements in State Law:** Certification ensures state requirements for transportation planning are being met.
- Transportation Funding:** Certification of local comprehensive plans is required by PSRC for jurisdictions to be eligible for PSRC's federal transportation funding.

# Covered Employment Estimates



Estimates of the number of payroll workers by industry sector

**How it's useful:** Can be used to understand the mix of employment in an area. Understanding the employment mix can help ensure that land use planning matches to economic goals. Can also be used to understand employment within the county, or in neighboring or peer jurisdictions.

**How to access:** PSRC annually publishes covered employment data at the city and census tract level.

# Top Employers

**How it's useful:** Provides more specific information about employers and the industries they represent in the local or regional economy. Can be leveraged for business retention and expansion efforts.

**How to access:** Usually requires direct outreach. Other organizations such as chambers of commerce Associate Development Organizations (ADOs), or media sources often compile these lists at the county or regional level.

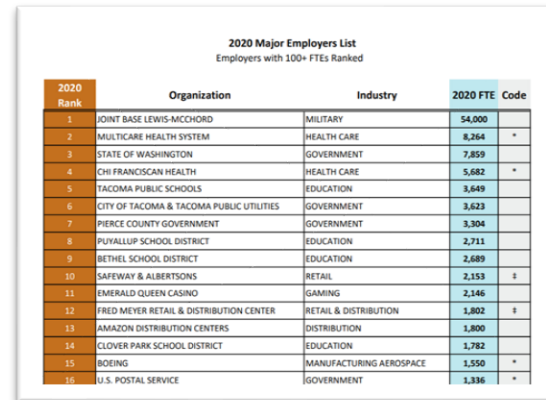

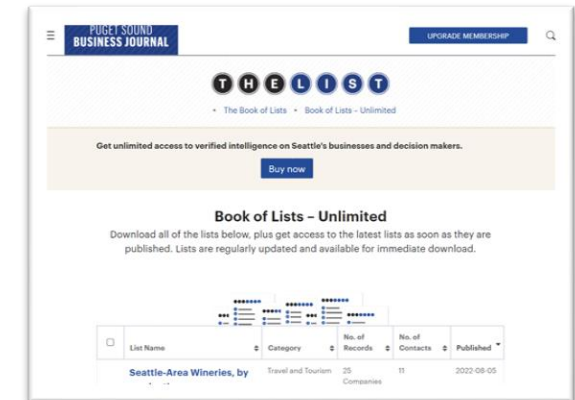

# Key Regional Export Industries



The industries in the region that focus on goods and services for export

**How it's useful:** Locally focused businesses such as retail, restaurants, and services scale to accommodate the local population. Jobs in export focused industries can be located many places in a global market and regions compete for these jobs. Can help add specificity to employment growth targets.

**How to access:** The Regional Economic Strategy identifies key industry that focus on exporting goods and services to other regions.

# Taxable Retail Sales



The dollar amount of retail sales within a jurisdiction by industry category

**How it's useful:** Gives a direct indication of consumer spending in the jurisdiction, highlighting the local business mix. Understanding taxable retail sales also helps calculate city tax revenues and determine tax levels.

**How to access:** The Washington State Department of Revenue provides quarterly and annual reports for retail sales at the city and county levels.

The amount of employment compared in a specific geographic area compared to the amount of housing

**How it's useful:** Providing better balance between jobs and housing connects residents with more employment opportunities. Helps jurisdictions to plan for improved geographic distribution of housing and employment opportunities addressing both housing needs and job growth needs.

**How to access:** The American Community Survey (ACS) and U.S. Census provide this data. PSRC compiles ACS data for jurisdictions.

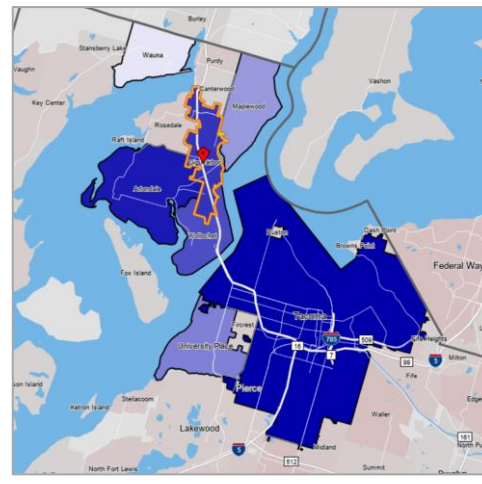
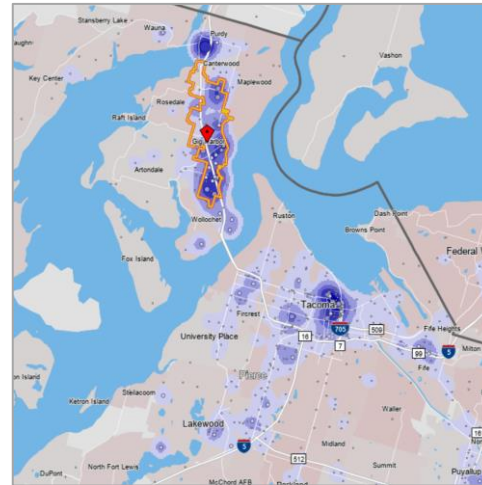
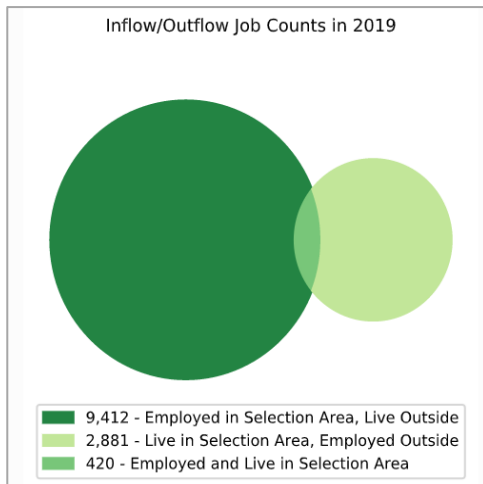
Commute patterns of local workers and residents, identifying where people live compared to where they work

**How it's useful:** Can help identify where a jurisdiction's residents work and what industries they work in. Can help target job growth opportunities to provide options for residents live and work in the same community. Commute patterns also have transportation system implications and can help jurisdictions make informed decisions on how to grow and sustain the transportation network.

**How to access:** The U.S. Census provides detailed workforce commute statistics via the Longitudinal-Employer Household Dynamics survey, including a visualization tool.

# Educational Attainment



## Summary of resident's highest level of education achieved

**How it's useful:** Can help educational institutions better tailor programs to prepare the workforce for local industries. Historically, educational attainment has varied across racial groups and this data can demonstrate educational gaps between white and BIPOC residents.

**How to access:** The American Community Survey (ACS) and U.S. Census provide this data. PSRC compiles ACS data for jurisdictions



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# Workforce Demographics



Characteristics of the local workforce by age, race, ethnicity, gender identification, and others

**How it's useful:** Provides a detailed description of what groups are included in the local economy. Can be used to inform local economic development goals such as goods and service needs, workforce training, and housing.

**How to access:** The American Community Survey (ACS) and U.S. Census provide this data. PSRC compiles ACS data for jurisdictions.



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# Income and Poverty



The level of income earned and a measurement of falling below a certain threshold lacking the financial resources to meet the cost of living

**How it's useful:** Understanding community income levels are essential to understanding economic health and opportunity. Income and poverty are correlated with a vast number of indicators related to health, education, and quality of life. Analyzing income and poverty statistics for different demographic groups is critical to informing policies that are effective in correcting past economic injustices.

**How to access:** The American Community Survey (ACS) and U.S. Census provide this data. PSRC compiles ACS data for jurisdictions



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# Opportunity Mapping



A map of geographic areas analyzed by indicators that impact economic opportunity

**How it's useful:** Geographic mapping of opportunity shows where opportunity-rich communities exist and who has access to them, which is critical to understanding what groups and areas have inherent opportunity advantages. Tracks indicators such as education, economic health, housing, transportation, health, and the environment. Establishes a foundation for improving outcomes in low opportunity areas and increasing access to high opportunity areas.

**How to access:** PSRC has developed an opportunity mapping tool.



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# Commercial Affordability



Measures the cost of leasing commercial space for business owners

**How it's useful:** Indicates trends in real estate prices to determine if specific areas are becoming unaffordable for small businesses. Most commonly reported in average price per square foot. A lack of affordable commercial space is one of the key drivers of small business closure and/or displacement.

**How to access:** The most popular source of data for the commercial rent market is CoStar, which requires a paid subscription. Another option for tracking commercial affordability are quarterly reports from private firms like Kidder Mathews. These reports distill CoStar data into regional and county-level analysis and can be accessed free of charge.



# Employment Capacity



The number of jobs that a given area can accommodate given existing infrastructure and availability of land

**How it's useful:** Is critical for economic growth and accommodating job growth targets in a city, county, or subarea. If a gap exists between the job targets and capacity, identifying the gap helps identify planning needs to accommodate the growth target. Employment density can vary depending on the type of business model local employers have and what industries they are in.

**How to access:** Employment capacity is tracked through countywide Buildable Lands Reports required by the Growth Management Act.

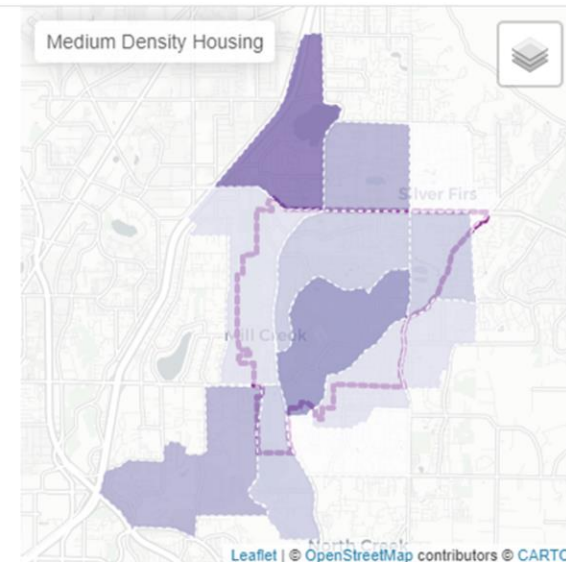
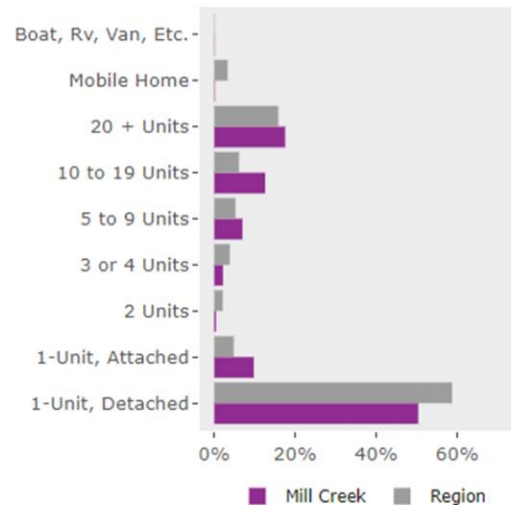

The region has a prospering and sustainable regional economy by supporting businesses and job creation, investing in all people and their health, sustaining environmental quality, and creating great central places, diverse communities, and high quality of life.

# #1: Identifying industries to grow



VISION 2050 Policy Objective:

**Identify and enhance industry clusters, including those recognized in the Regional Economic Strategy that provide goods and services for export**

- The region has several **key industries** that export goods and services to other regions.
- These industries bring dollars into the region helping to **sustain a strong economy**.
- **Tapping into an existing regional industry** concentration or a regional supply chain can help a community meet its economic goals.
- Goals for business and job growth are **more attainable if they are tied to specific target industries**.

# #1: Identifying industries to grow



## Policy considerations:

- Local plans and policies should recognize a community's **critical industrial areas or airports**.
- Local transportation plans and investments should support manufacturing **supply chains that require efficient movement of materials** and products through the region.
- Policies can **leverage partners** like trade organizations, educational institutions, and major employers.
- **County-specific economic development plans** should be reviewed in local goal setting.

  - Locally, women-, and minority-owned businesses and start-up companies;
  - Established and emerging industries, technologies, and services that promote environmental sustainability, especially those addressing climate change and resilience
- 
- VISION 2050 calls for the support of **locally, women- and minority-owned businesses and start-up companies**.
  - VISION 2050 also calls for increased attention to retaining and **expanding environmentally sustainable industries**, technologies, and services.
  - **Targeting living wage jobs** for growth can help strengthen the local and regional economy.

## #2: Recruiting, retaining, and expanding businesses



### Policy considerations:

- Recruitment and retention activities can be **done directly by the local jurisdiction or with support from other local organizations.**
- Expansion efforts should **align with policies from other economic goals** related to industry clusters, expanding economic opportunity, and businesses that support living wage jobs.
- Activities can be paired with **branding and marketing, hiring policies, and strategic partnerships** with industry groups, educational institutions, trade unions, and others.

- VISION 2050 calls for local plans to **expand access to opportunity** and advance racial equity through economic policies.
- Access to opportunity **plays a significant role in life outcomes.**
- Opportunity mapping tools can help **identify existing disparities and evaluate planning decisions.**

# #3: Expanding access to opportunity



## Policy considerations:

- **Educational policies** can partner a community's economic goals with approaches to the local public education system.
- Communities home to post-secondary training programs can work to **connect targeted communities** with these opportunities.
- **Infrastructure investments** can be targeted towards geographic areas that are most disconnected from economic opportunity.
- Being intentional with **how to spend public funds**, including **government contracting** can help cultivate underrepresented businesses.

# #4: Mitigating displacement of businesses



VISION 2050 Policy Objective:

**Address and prevent potential physical, economic, and cultural displacement of existing businesses that may result from redevelopment and market pressure**

- VISION 2050 recognizes that **rising land values** and population and job growth contribute to a commercial displacement crisis.
- Commercial displacement can result when business owners are **priced out of local real estate markets**, as either rent or property tax increases become unaffordable.
- **Small business owners are most at risk** and are often located in communities of color.

# #4: Mitigating displacement of businesses



## Policy considerations:

- Through **zoning codes**, jurisdictions can create size-restricted districts that preserve smaller commercial spaces.
- Jurisdictions can also **subsidize expenses such as streetscape and façade improvements** through loans and matching grant programs.
- Jurisdictions can provide **relocation assistance** to businesses looking to reestablish themselves in more affordable locations.
- Policies and initiatives should be paired with business **outreach, technical assistance, and education** efforts.

# #4: Mitigating displacement of businesses

<p><i>Promote the local use of special small business financing and management assistance programs. # #5: Expanding availability of jobs for residents



VISION 2050 Policy Objective:

**Develop a range of employment opportunities to create a closer balance between jobs and housing**

- VISION 2050 and the Regional Growth Strategy strive to achieve an **improved jobs-housing balance**.
- A better balance **provides numerous community benefits**, including reduced traffic congestion, air emissions, and commute times.
- Can be improved by addressing both **housing for workers**, and **jobs for working residents**.
- Unaffordable housing markets can **negatively impact recruitment and retention efforts**.



# #5: Expanding availability of jobs for residents



## Policy considerations:

- Seek to **develop and expand employment opportunities** for current residents.
- Policies and programs should **operate in tandem with policies in the Housing Element** of comprehensive plans to establish a proper balance within a community.

## #6: Promoting responsible business practices



### VISION 2050 Policy Objective:

**Promote environmental and socially responsible business practices, especially those addressing climate change, resilience, and improved health outcomes**

- VISION 2050 and the Regional Economic Strategy both acknowledge that the region's **natural environment is a unique asset** to attract talent and strengthen the economy.
- VISION 2050 also recognizes the **impacts of climate change** on the economy.
- **Promoting a healthy, resilient environment and communities** is key to continued economic success.
- The **state and region are working to support development** of established and emerging industries focused on resilience and climate change.

# #6: Promoting responsible business practices



## Policy considerations:

- Economic development planning **should prioritize environmental and social responsibility** to build sustainability into the local economy.
- Communities should **prioritize businesses that promote environmental and social responsibility** when working with partners to attract new businesses.
- Communities can recognize the importance of their **natural environment as an economic asset**.
- **Target job growth** in industry sectors that are working to address climate change.

# #7: Leveraging cultural assets



## VISION 2050 Policy Objective:

**Support, recognize, and empower the contributions of the region's culturally and ethnically diverse communities, institutions, and Native Tribes**

- VISION 2050 recognizes that the region's **culturally and ethnically diverse communities contribute to vibrant local economies.**
- These unique assets help create jobs and opportunities, but **opportunities and resources are not allocated equitably.**
- **Jurisdictions know the value of local historical and cultural context** best, and local plans can recognize, preserve, and empower cultural and ethnic communities, institutions, and Native Tribes.

# #7: Leveraging cultural assets



## Policy considerations:

- Communities can set **intentional goals and policies** that advance racial equity and strive for inclusion of all.
- **Equitable outreach** strategies should be used to ensure policies are community-led and supported.
- **Highlighting the achievements and innovation of these groups and supporting cultural events.**
- Provide **funding opportunities for arts and cultural institutions, programming, and education.**
- **Create pathways for under-resourced communities** to start businesses, access commercial real estate, and sustain economic assets.

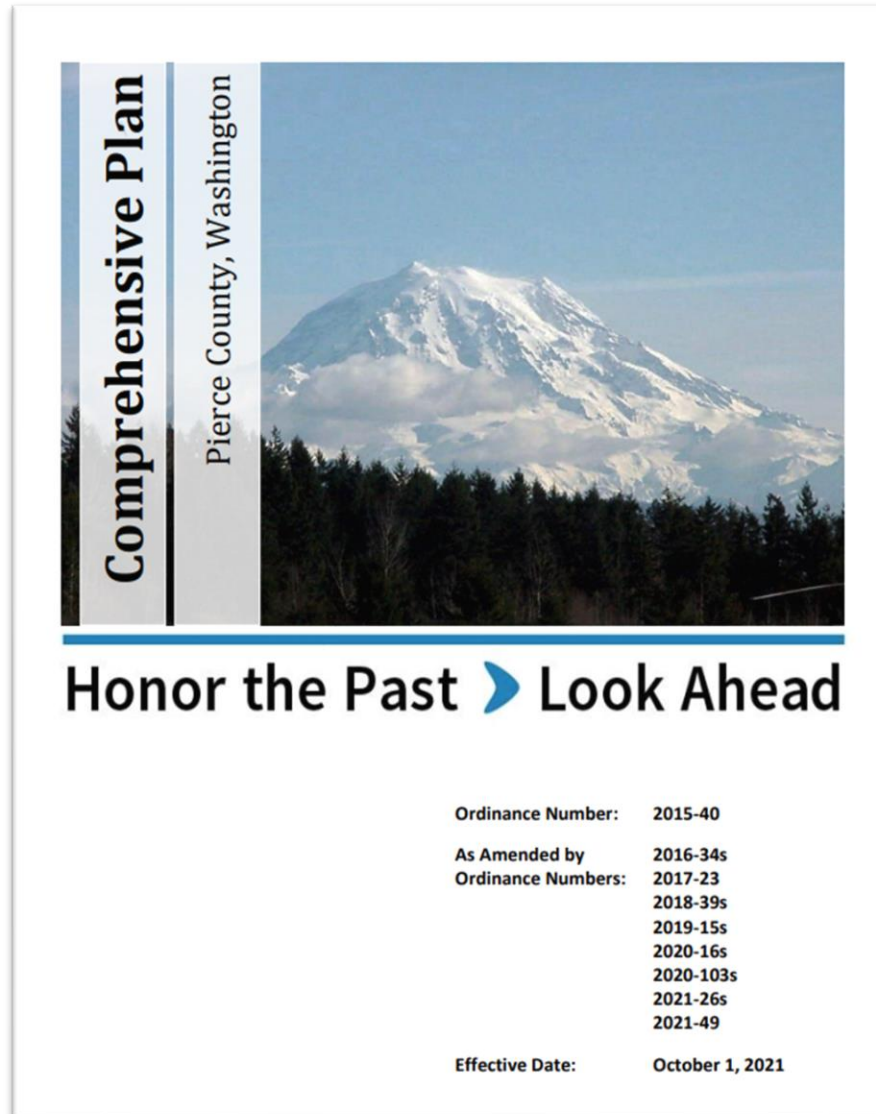
