Committee Outreach Update

- PSRC staff conducted outreach meetings with 25 committee members in November/December 2022.
 More meetings are planned for January.
- Participants represented organizations in all four counties, including:
 - County parks and public works
 - Municipal planning and public works
 - Transit agencies
 - Public health districts
 - Community and educational groups





Local Knowledge and Expertise

- Participants shared information on their active transportation planning, projects and programs.
- BPAC members have a wide range of bicycle and pedestrian knowledge and expertise about:
 - ✓ Roadway network bike/ped infrastructure
 - ✓ Separate ROW shared use paths
 - ✓ Education, safety and outreach programs
 - ✓ Bike/ped transit access
 - ✓ Public health related to built environment
 - ✓ Emerging trends and technologies





PSRC Work Program Feedback

- Participants provided feedback on the upcoming PSRC bicycle and pedestrian work program.
- BPAC members suggested several ways PSRC can provide value as the regional entity, including:
 - ✓ Aggregating and analyzing regional data
 - ✓ Tracking regional bike/ped metrics
 - ✓ Providing technical guidance and resources
 - ✓ Encouraging local coordination
 - ✓ Providing a forum for sharing best practices
 - ✓ Coordinating with related PSRC processes





Suggestions for Committee Engagement

- Members had several ideas for how to enhance BPAC engagement:
 - ✓ Use virtual meeting tools, e.g., surveys, virtual whiteboards, break-out rooms
 - ✓ Ensure all member voices are heard
 - ✓ Clarify meeting purposes and next steps
 - ✓ Provide opportunities for member sharing and relationship building
 - ✓ Consider potential site visits and tours





Hybrid Meetings Feedback

- Based on survey, majority of members said they would be interested in some hybrid meetings in 2023.
- About a third said they would be likely to attend in-person and a third were not sure.
- Members unlikely to attend said traveling to downtown Seattle would be difficult, with some suggesting alternative locations for meetings.
- Multiple members said meetings should only be hybrid if there is a compelling need.
