EAC Meet and Greet

Shannon Turner, from Kitsap County, and Charles Patton, PSRC, called the meeting to order at 5:30 pm. The co-chair welcomed everyone, and Noah began the EAC meet and greet to introduce new members to the committee.

EAC Member Report Out

Committee members were given an opportunity to share out about upcoming events or projects in their region. Jewel Sheperd-Sampson shared that a weekend long celebration will be held at the Bainbridge Island Museum in honor of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. from January 13-15. More information on this series of community events may be found here. Elly Trinh shared that Northwest Green Home Tour is holding a community event to share information about green building practices, with more information available here. Shannon Turner shared that through January 24-26 in Poulsbo, Bremerton, and Port Orchard, resource events will be held to support unhoused individuals in the community. Equity Pilot Program

PSRC has project selection authority for several sources of funding from the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and the Federal Transit Administration (FTA). Between January and September 2023, the Equity Advisory Committee (EAC) will work with PSRC staff to develop a pilot program to distribute approximately \$6 million of PSRC's 2025-2026 FHWA funds with a focused lens on equity. This Equity Pilot Program will also inform future PSRC project selection processes.

SUBJECT: EAC Co-chairs

IN BRIEF

During its meeting on February 2, 2023, Equity Advisory Committee (EAC) members will learn about the roles and responsibilities of committee co-chairs and about how they will select co-chairs.

DISCUSSION

During its meeting on February 2, 2023, EAC members will learn about the roles and responsibilities of committee co-chairs and about how they will select co-chairs. Members will also be asked about their interest in serving a one-year term as a co-chair for the committee. Responsibilities for the position include:

- Meeting preparation (e.g., participating in meeting dry runs)
- Facilitating discussions (e.g., monitoring the chat for questions)
- Providing leadership (e.g., representing the committee at one Executive Board meeting)

Members who express interest in this position will be asked to submit a brief questionnaire (see Attachment A). This will be used to provide some additional information about each candidate, so EAC members can make an informed decision about who they would like to serve as their co-chairs. The responses to this questionnaire will be included in the meeting packet for the March meeting.

Chris serves as a councilmember for the City of Auburn. He's been committed to fighting for racial equity and justice as a lawyer representing Indian tribes across the nation and has also served in positions within the federal government devoted to upholding treaty rights and improving services to Indian tribes.

Why do you want to serve as a co-chair (75-word limit)?

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What experiences and/or skills do you have that will help you serve as an effective co-chair (75-word limit)?

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Why are you interested in advancing racial equity and what have you done to help reduce racial inequities (75-word limit)?

I firmly believe that our region will only advance and grow after we acknowledge the historic roots of systemic racism and call on local governments and leaders to enact specific strategies to promote racial equity and justice. My work has included co-writing the 1994 Indian Self-Determination Act Amendments, as well as serving as the first-ever Director of Native American Affairs at the U.S. Energy Department. I believe that representation truly does matter. And that is why I ran for local office. So that Native Americans so often overlooked or mistreated, could bring their perspectives to the table.

SUBJECT: Project Selection Process and Equity: Review of PSRC's Current

Process

IN BRIEF

Between January and September 2023, the Equity Advisory Committee (EAC) will work with PSRC staff to review PSRC's current project selection process as it relates to equity, and ultimately develop an equity pilot program to distribute approximately \$6 million of PSRC's 2025-2026 Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) funds. The EAC will also develop recommendations for potential further equity improvements in future PSRC project selection processes.

During the upcoming meeting of the Equity Advisory Committee, members will continue the briefing on the current PSRC project selection process. The discussion will include an in-depth review of the equity criteria strengthened in 2022 and an assessment of the projects awarded funding from an equity lens.

DISCUSSION

PSRC conducts a project selection process to distribute federal transportation funds every two years. The process and the criteria used to evaluate every project is based on policies and outcomes detailed in VISION 2050 and the Regional Transportation Plan. These include elements such as accessibility, multimodal mobility, safety, equity and climate, as well as financial and project readiness considerations.

In addition to substantial improvements to how equity was incorporated into the existing project selection process, as part of the 2022 *Policy Framework* approximately \$6 million of PSRC's FHWA funds were set aside for an Equity Pilot Program. The EAC is asked to co-create this program, developing the parameters by which projects would be selected for funding, with an overarching focus on improving equity with transportation investments.

During the January meeting, members of the Equity Advisory Committee were provided an overview of the current project selection process and outcomes. These discussions will continue at the February meeting, to dive deeper into the current equity criteria and the final projects selected for funding.

In addition, based on questions received during the January briefing, additional information is provided for further reference:

- Attachment 1 is a process overview of the Equity Pilot Program for reference;
- Attachment 2 is a summary of the existing PSRC funding process and key requirements; and
- Attachment 3 is an overview of all transportation funding sources in the region.

After the presentation, members will be asked the following questions:

- Are the equity criteria clear? Do they lead to an improved evaluation of transportation projects from an equity perspective?
 - o Is anything missing?
- Do the projects that were ultimately awarded funding provide overall benefits?
 - o Do the projects provide improvements to equitable outcomes?
 - o Do you see any gaps or needs not reflected in the projects?

SUBJECT: Project Selection Process and Equity: Learning from Other MPOs

IN BRIEF

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During the upcoming meeting of the Equity Advisory Committee, members will hear how other Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPOs) across the country have incorporated equity in the project selection process and share thoughts on what strategies might be useful for PSRC to consider.

DISCUSSION

PSRC conducts a project selection process to distribute federal transportation funds every two years. The process and the criteria used to evaluate every project is based on policies and outcomes detailed in VISION 2050 and the Regional Transportation Plan. They include elements such as accessibility, multimodal mobility, safety, equity and climate, as well as financial and project readiness considerations.

In addition to substantial improvements to how equity was incorporated into the existing project selection process, as part of the 2022 *Policy Framework* approximately \$6 million of PSRC's FHWA funds were set aside for an Equity Pilot Program. The EAC is asked to co-create this program, developing the parameters by which projects would be selected for funding, with an overarching focus on improving equity with transportation investments.

During the January meeting, members of the Equity Advisory Committee were provided with an overview of the current project selection process and outcomes. These discussions will continue at the February meeting, to dive deeper into the current equity criteria and the final projects selected for funding.

Also, during the February meeting, members will hear examples of how other MPOs have incorporated equity into their project selection process. Staff will share six different project selection evaluation categories and corresponding examples. These categories include:

- **Location burdens-based**: considers the location of a project within predefined areas with high concentrations of marginalized populations as detrimental for them; awards points if the project is not located within these areas.
- **Location benefits-based**: considers the location of a project within predefined areas with high concentrations of marginalized populations as beneficial for them; awards points if the project is located within these areas.
- **Impact benefits-based**: considers the potential benefits a project will have on predefined areas with high concentrations of marginalized populations and awards more points to projects that will have positive effects.
- Access to destinations-based: considers the accessibility improvements that
 projects provide to predefined areas with high concentrations of marginalized
 populations and awards more points to projects that will provide greater
 increases in access to key destinations.
- User-based: considers the number of users of a project that will belong to the
 population defined as marginalized and awards more points to projects with
 greater number of marginalized users.
- Community-engagement considerations: considers how project sponsors involved marginalized communities prior to and during a project's development and awards more points to projects that show stronger community participation efforts.

After the presentation, members will be asked the following questions:

- What evaluation categories from the other MPOs would you like to explore for further incorporation into PSRC's process?
 - O Why do you like the evaluation category?
 - O What will it add to our process?
