MINUTES OF THE TRANSPORTATION POLICY BOARD

January 12, 2022

CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 9:30 a.m. by Mayor Dana Ralph, Chair. Chair Ralph announced that the Transportation Policy Board meeting would be hybrid, allowing for remote and in-person attendance. The meeting will be live streamed, and a call-in number provided for members of the public to listen.

Mayor Ralph welcomed new members and alternates to the board:

A quorum was established by roll call.

COMMUNICATIONS AND PUBLIC COMMENT

REPORT OF THE CHAIR

Chair Ralph thanked the board for their work over the last year and also acknowledged PSRC staff for their dedication and efforts.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Kelly McGourty, PSRC, welcomed the board and noted the significant work program for 2023, including several small funding competitions that will be held. Ms. McGourty also noted the upcoming launch of the Regional Electric Vehicle Collaborative web-based clearinghouse. This is a partnership project with the Puget Sound Clean Air Agency (PSCAA) that has been underway for several years.

Robin Koskey, PSRC, shared that the Executive Board adopted PSRC's legislative agenda. She shared highlights of the Governor's budget and priorities for transportation including safety, ferries, and others.

<u>ACTION</u>: The motion was made by Councilmember Ryan Mello and seconded by Mayor Kim Roscoe to adopt the Consent Agenda. The motion passed unanimously.

CONSOLIDATED GRANT COMPETITION REGIONAL RANKINGS

Jean Kim, PSRC, provided an overview of the Consolidated Grant Competition held by WSDOT. WSDOT's consolidated grant program provides funding from a variety of federal and state sources for specialized transportation services. PSRC does not award funding, but rather allocates rankings that align with regional priorities.

Ms. Kim provided an overview of the grant process and how PSRC awards rankings. This year, PSRC initiated a new step to have presentations from applicants which was very helpful. PSRC works with the Special Needs Transportation Committee to develop regional Priority Ranking Factors. These factors are designed to support PSRC's Coordinated Mobility Plan.

Ms. Kim provided a summary of the recommendation to allocate regional priority rankings to submitted projects. After approval by the TPB, PSRC's regional priority rankings are scheduled for review and approval by PSRC's Executive Board at its January meeting.

ACTION: The motion was made by Councilmember Kate Kruller and seconded by Councilmember Ryan Mello that the Transportation Policy Board should recommend Executive Board approval of regional priority rankings for the WSDOT Consolidated Grant

competition as found in Attachment A. The motion passed unanimously.

CLIMATE CHANGE IMPLEMENTATION STRATEGY

Kelly McGourty, PSRC, shared that the board has been briefed on the 2030 climate analysis over the last several months, including sensitivity tests that were modeled to estimate further emissions reductions to meet the 2030 climate goal.

Craig Helmann, PSRC, reviewed forecasted changes in population and employment growth for 2030. Mr. Helmann noted that with projects planned in the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP), there are increases in the number of transit, walk, and bike trips, and decreases in driving and delay on the system.

Mr. Helmann shared the results of sensitivity tests focused on user fees, choices, and technology. He shared the results of testing different rates of a Road Usage Charge (RUC). The RUC has a significant impact on transit ridership, vehicle miles traveled (VMT), and emissions. He noted that transportation alternatives become more important with a higher RUC rate. Mr. Helmann noted increasing transit access didn't see as big an impact in 2030 as was seen in the modeling for 2050.

Mr. Helmann further shared the results of sensitivity tests for work from home levels, elimination of roadway capacity projects, and increases in zero-emission vehicles. He noted that varying work from home levels saw strong emission reduction potential. He noted a high level of work from home rates meant lower VMT levels and lower delay on the system but also a reduction in transit ridership. Mr. Helmann shared that elimination of roadway capacity projects, many of which support transit and freight, had a minimal reduction on emissions but increased delay on the system.

Mr. Helmann referred to the analysis report included in the agenda packet for further details. The board will receive metrics at future meetings to see how different sensitivity tests change different parts of the network.

Ms. McGourty shared that PSRC created a hybrid scenario that combined the three most promising levers - user fees, work from home, and technology. Mr. Helmann described the specific levels of each that were included in the hybrid scenario. Ms. McGourty shared that the combination of the RTP, VISION 2050, state actions and the hybrid test of these three levers could meet the 2030 climate goal. However, she noted that continued commitment to implementing each element, including the planned regional growth strategy and expansion of the transit network is critical to success.

Board members discussed the differences between the assumptions on the RUC in PSRC's plans versus what is currently being discussed at the state. Board members also shared that there may be a need to increase the education level among PSRC member agencies about the nuances of the RUC and to more seriously engage for the RUC to succeed. Board members also requested additional metrics from the sensitivity

tests be provided, related to equity and co-benefits beyond emissions reduction. Suggestions on additional hybrid scenarios to analyze were made, including a reduced RUC rate, bringing in the transit sensitivities, and considering a more aggressive land use scenario.

REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION PLAN PERFORMANCE DASHBOARD

Mr. Helmann shared that the board has previously shared feedback on what elements should be included in the RTP performance dashboard. Mr. Helmann reviewed the type of information currently available in the dashboard and what is still in progress. He gave an overview of the maps, data comparisons and performance metrics available in the draft dashboard and the overall approach. Board members were invited to visit the dashboard and provide staff with feedback for improvements.

Board members shared that maps are useful, and asked if the dashboard could show additional elements such as exposure disparities, health equity and cost burdens if feasible. Staff shared that anywhere PSRC has data on race, income, etc. those metrics will be included in the dashboard.

DRAFT FY2024-2025 BIENNIAL BUDGET AND WORK PROGRAM

Andrew Werfelmann, PSRC, shared progress on the new draft biennial budget and work program. The budget was prepared under the guidance of PSRC's Operations Committee. It is balanced and sustainable and supports ongoing and new work. The budget projects an increase in membership dues to meet goals for PSRC's contingency fund.

Mr. Werfelmann gave an overview of budget revenue and expenditure estimates. Board members have an opportunity to provide comments by March 16. The final budget is scheduled for approval by the Executive Board in April and adoption by the PSRC General Assembly at the May meeting.

IN BRIEF

Six agencies submitted fourteen projects this month for routine amendment into the Regional TIP. The projects are summarized in Exhibit A. These projects were awarded local, state, and federal funding through various funding processes, such as the Connecting Washington funds managed by the Washington State Department of Transportation. PSRC staff reviewed the projects for compliance with federal and state requirements and consistency with VISION 2050 and the Regional Transportation Plan.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

The Transportation Policy Board should recommend Executive Board adoption of an amendment to the 2023-2026 Regional TIP to include the projects as shown in Exhibit A.

DISCUSSION

Under the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA), PSRC has project selection authority for all projects programming regional funds from the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) - Surface Transportation Block Grant Program (STBG) and Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement Program (CMAQ) - and Federal Transit Administration (FTA) - Urbanized Area Formula Program (5307), State of Good Repair (5337), Bus and Bus Facilities Formula (5339), and Enhanced Mobility of Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities (5310).

While PSRC does not have project selection authority for other types of federal, state, or local funds, the Executive Board has the responsibility for adding these projects to the Regional TIP. Each project must comply with requirements regarding plan consistency, air quality, and financial constraint. The attached Exhibit A illustrates the action needed to amend the Regional TIP.

The recommended action would approve the TIP amendment request based on a finding of consistency with VISION 2050, the Regional Transportation Plan, and the air quality conformity determination of the Regional TIP. Approval is also based on a determination that funding is reasonably expected to be available to carry out the project. Information describing plan consistency, air quality conformity, and the funding basis for approving the request is further described below.

Consistency with VISION 2050 and the Regional Transportation Plan

The projects recommended for action were reviewed by PSRC staff and were determined to be consistent with the multicounty policies in VISION 2050 and the Regional Transportation Plan.

Air Quality Conformity

The projects in Exhibit A were reviewed and it has been determined that a new air quality analysis and conformity determination is not required because each project falls into one or more of the following categories:

- It is exempt from air quality conformity requirements.
- It is an existing project already included in the current air quality modeling.
- It is a non-exempt project not able to be included in the regional model.

Funding Reasonably Expected to be Available

For the projects in Exhibit A, PSRC has confirmed the funds are reasonably expected to be available.

Subject: Transportation Work Program Status Report and Milestones

IN BRIEF

The Transportation Policy Board spent the latter half of 2022 reviewing and discussing the implementation action items identified in the Regional Transportation Plan. At the February 9 meeting, a proposed template for regular reporting on the progress of each element will be presented for board consideration.

DISCUSSION

The <u>Regional Transportation Plan</u> (RTP) identifies numerous implementation items, covering all of the major plan elements and policy focus areas. These implementation items call for new and continued work to be done by PSRC, local agencies and other regional and state partners.

Throughout the latter half of 2022, the Transportation Policy Board reviewed a summary of these various work program items and provided feedback on priority timelines and key scoping elements. A more detailed draft timeline for PSRC's upcoming work program was prepared and is attached for reference.

In addition to future board briefings on major elements, the board requested that staff develop an informational item to regularly track and report progress on each of the implementation areas. At the February meeting, a draft template for this reporting will be provided for board review and feedback. The desired frequency of these reports will also be requested.





Subject: Puget Sound Regional Electric Vehicle Collaborative

IN BRIEF

PSRC has been partnering with the Puget Sound Clean Air Agency on a Regional Electric Vehicle (REV) Collaborative since 2019. A web-based resource clearinghouse was recently launched to help support this work. Staff from both agencies will brief the Transportation Policy Board on the clearinghouse and outreach efforts at the February 9 meeting.

DISCUSSION

The Transportation Policy Board has been briefed at various times over the last several years on the ongoing work of the REV Collaborative partnership, which has included hosting five forums, conducting outreach, and developing a web-based clearinghouse. This work is discussed in the Regional Transportation Plan and is a key implementation element of the region's Four-Part Greenhouse Gas Strategy.

The web-based clearinghouse (<u>www.pugetsoundrev.org</u>) was recently launched, to provide resources and technical assistance to support public agencies in their work, and to encourage the advancement of an electrified transportation system throughout the region.

Staff from both agencies will provide information on the clearinghouse, ongoing outreach activities, and future work.

Subject: Report on PSRC 2024 Office Relocation

IN BRIEF

During the December 8 Transportation Policy Board presentation on PSRC's draft fiscal year 2024-2025 budget, the anticipated move to new office space in early 2024 was noted. At the February 9 meeting, staff will provide the board with a brief update on the new office space at 1201 Third Avenue in Seattle, and ongoing plans for the move.

DISCUSSION

PSRC's current leasing of the fifth-floor office space at Waterfront Place expires in early 2024. For several reasons, remaining at Waterfront Place proved to be infeasible. Staff began exploring new lease options in March 2021, and market research was conducted with the advice and counsel of a corporate real estate broker. PSRC was able to leverage the market to negotiate competitive proposals both in terms of rental rate and tenant improvement allowances. Over ten different properties were viewed, and multiple offers were solicited from late 2021 to July 2022. PSRC executed a new lease for space on the fifth floor of 1201 Third Avenue in late 2022. The Operations Committee has been overseeing the progress of the space selection and lease negotiations.

The new office space will allow for a larger board room that will be flexible in set up and size, depending on the number of in-person occupants. In addition, the space will provide more meeting rooms and more flexible space to support the hybrid work environment envisioned for the future. The space improves PSRC's space efficiency while accommodating potential future growth.

The new lease will commence January 1, 2024. Tenant improvements to the space will be constructed in 2023. Moving new and existing equipment and furniture will occur in

late 2023 and early 2024. Board meetings in December 2023 and January 2024 may need to be remote during the transition period.

Staff will provide additional details at the February 9 meeting of the Transportation Policy Board.
