Find a Ride's trip planner is part of a "one-call/one-click" system for Pierce, King, and Snohomish Counties. Hopelink recently completed the first phase of user testing, with a focus on older adults and people with disabilities. # Discussion: Debrief on the 2023 WSDOT Consolidated Grant Regional Priority Ranking Process

Jean Kim, PSRC, provided an overview of the 2023-25 Consolidated Grant Priority Ranking Process led by PSRC. She reviewed the regional ranking factors for staff assessment, additional considerations for deliberation, and results of the 2023 WSDOT award results. SNTC provided feedback on the process including sponsor presentations and deliberation meetings. Jean also shared the next steps that the committee will take to prepare for the next regional priority ranking process. Work will begin again in the spring of 2024 for the next call for projects in the summer of 2024 (tentatively).

**SUBJECT: Connecting People to Transit** 

#### **IN BRIEF**

The committee will be provided an informational update on PSRC's transit access work program progress to-date, including accomplishments of the September 12<sup>th</sup> ad hoc Transit Access Working Group meeting.

#### **DISCUSSION**

At past meetings, PSRC shared the work program developed from the Regional Transportation Plan's call to "...develop and update tools and resources to help identify where access to transit can be improved, particularly for bicyclists and pedestrians."

The work program started with a review of existing transit access tools and resources in conjunction with updated data to help identify potential improvements to transit access assessments and next steps. This initial task began with a review of existing tools, such as the PSRC Transit Access Checklist and Transit Access Toolkit, found on the PSRC Transit Access webpage. These work products were the result of a multi-year effort to examine transit access needs in the region, published in 2016-2017.

At the September SNTC meeting, PSRC staff will provide an update on the transit access work program and the ad hoc Transit Access Working Group that has been convened to support this work. The working group held its first meeting in July to gain common understanding of their charge and the existing transit access tools and data resources. The working group's second meeting was on September 12, one week prior to the SNTC meeting. Staff will report out on progress the working group is making, including the identification of case study locations to test existing transit access tools, resources, and data.

#### **NEXT STEPS**

Over the next few months, PSRC will conduct several case studies to test existing transit access tools, resources, and data. Staff will continue to convene the working group during this time to seek their input and help identify preliminary findings and recommendations. If possible, PSRC will plan to provide a briefing to SNTC at its November meeting to share findings to-date at that time.
