# Recommend Approval of Projects for Rural Town Center and Corridors Program and Transportation Alternatives Program Funding

The board recommended the Executive Board approve the lists of projects for the Rural Town Centers and Corridors (RTCC) Program and Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) funding, along with prioritized lists of contingency projects.

In May 2023, PSRC released a call for projects for all eligible sponsors for the RTCC program. After eligible projects were evaluated by countywide organizations and staff, the RTCC Project Selection Committee developed a recommended list of projects to receive the approximately \$6.09 million available. In June of 2023, PSRC released a call for projects under TAP. Staff scored applications for eligible projects based on the adopted project evaluation criteria, and the TAP Project Selection Committee developed a list of projects recommended to receive the \$23.6 million available.

On September 14, 2023, the board released the recommended RTCC and TAP projects for public review and comment; no comments have been received. <u>View video</u> and <u>presentation</u>.

### **Climate Pollution Reduction Grant Program**

Staff from the Puget Sound Clean Air Agency is leading an effort to develop a Regional Climate Action Plan, funded by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) under the Climate Pollution Reduction Grants program. Staff from PSCAA and PSRC provided an overview of these planning efforts and funds available from the program. The State of Washington has received \$3 million, and the Puget Sound region received \$1 million for planning work. EPA has also recently released the Notice of Funding Opportunity for \$4.6 billion in implementation funding, to be tied to the planning work. Applications are due April 2024, and it is anticipated that grants will be awarded within tiers between \$2 million and \$500 million. View presentation.

### **Preparing for the 2024 Project Selection Process**

The board discussed preparations for the 2024 project selection process with an emphasis on safety, climate, and equity. A competitive project selection process is conducted every two to three years for the distribution of PSRC's federal funds. The next process will be conducted in 2024 for PSRC's 2027-2028 Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and Federal Transit Administration (FTA) funds. The board discussed the background of the project evaluation criteria, information on previously funded projects, administrative details of the project selection process and key policy questions. Preparation for the 2024 project selection process will continue over the next several months resulting in a recommendation on the Policy Framework in January 2024. View presentation.

#### **TOD Event Recap**

Staff presented a recap of PSRC's Transit-Oriented Development (TOD) event, From Pandemic to Prosperity: Downtowns Reimagined, held on September 29, 2023. # Regional Safety Plan Draft Scope of Work

Gary Simonson, PSRC Senior Planner, briefed the board on the work to develop a draft scope of work for the Regional Safety Plan, developed through funding awarded by the USDOT Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) Grant Program.

Mr. Simonson reported on the Regional Safety Summit held on June 29, 2023, that included elected officials, transportation experts, and agency staff to understand road safety in the region and how the region can achieve zero fatalities and serious injuries

on our roadways. With feedback from the summit as well as to components required by USDOT under the provisions of the SS4A planning grant, PSRC has developed a draft scope of work for a Regional Safety Plan.

Mr. Simonson shared safety trends in the region. He then shared guiding principles for the Regioal Safety Plan, reviewed work to date and discussed next steps for plan development.

# **Washington State Ferries Presentation**

Nicole McIntosh, Washington State Ferries Deputy Assistant Secretary, discussed issues the ferry system is grappling with and some ways PSRC and the board can support the ferry system.

Washington has the largest ferry system in the nation, with 21 auto-passenger ferries and around 6.8 million total riders from January 1,2023 to May 31, 2023. However, vessel availability and difficulty in workforce recruitment, retention, and development have led to some challenges. To remedy these issues, WSF has invested in recruitment with media campaigns and providing career paths and new training programs.

Robin Koskey, PSRC Director of Government Relations and Communications, briefed the board on the process of developing PSRC's legislative priorities and sought feedback on potential legislative policy items.

Like PSRC's Recommendations to the 2023 State Legislature, the agency is proposing a framework of keeping the region moving; increasing housing choices and affordability; significantly reducing greenhouse gas emissions; and sustaining a strong economy. The Equity Advisory Committee, the Growth Management Policy Board, and the Transportation Policy Board will be briefed on the priorities in October, and the Executive Committee will propose the Executive Board adopt the legislative agenda at the December meeting.

#### **IN BRIEF**

Authorization by the Executive Board is required for the Executive Director to enter a contract more than \$10,000 per year. A request is being made to authorize contracts with one or more vendors to provide moving services.

#### RECOMMENDED ACTIONS

Recommend that the Executive Board authorize the Executive Director to enter one or more contracts to purchase moving services in an amount not to exceed \$60,000.

#### **BUDGET IMPACT**

The adopted FY 2024-2025 Biennial Budget and Work Program includes sufficient funds within the administrative services budget for this project for these moving services. In addition, under the terms of the lease, PSRC is allotted \$100,000 for moverelated expenses.

#### DISCUSSION

Beginning in 2022, staff inventoried existing furniture, equipment, supplies, records, and other items that will need to be moved to the new office space at 1201 3<sup>rd</sup>. Its lease at the new location begins January 1, 2024. Using the state of Washington's contract, staff received several bids. It is anticipated that the move would take place on Saturday, December 30<sup>th</sup> and therefore staff can arrive on site to the new office space on Tuesday, January 2, 2024. Because the lease at Waterfront Place expires in May 2024,

administrative services staff will be using the additional time to dispose of surplus property and other items not needed in the new office space.

**Subject: Approve Contract Authorization for Purchasing of Regional** 

**Macroeconomic Forecast Data** 

#### IN BRIEF

Authorization by the Executive Board is required for the Executive Director to enter into a contract in excess of \$10,000 per year. A request is being made to authorize a contract for the purchase of regional macroeconomic forecast data.

#### RECOMMENDED ACTION

Recommend that the Executive Board authorize the Executive Director to enter into a contract to purchase regional macroeconomic forecast data not to exceed \$60,000.

#### **BUDGET IMPACT**

The adopted Biennial Budget and Work Program Fiscal Years 2023-2024 includes \$75,000 within Data (Task 400) for the Regional Macroeconomic Forecast update.

#### **DISCUSSION**

PSRC has pursued a variety of data collection and research efforts to support the development of agency plans and continued refinements to regional modeling. Long term growth forecasts were last prepared for the Central Puget Sound region in 2018, two years before the COVID-19 pandemic. As the region continues to transition post-pandemic and long-term behaviors continue to change, it is important to understand how forecasts for population and jobs might have changed. These forecasts will be an important input for the analysis of the 2026 Regional Transportation Plan.

To help support this work, PSRC staff are requesting contract authority to purchase additional regional macroeconomic forecast data. There are numerous sources of regional economic forecast data that local and state agencies rely on for long term population and jobs forecasts. The advantage of these products in uncertain times is they come with access to national expertise on trends driving the forecasts and they allow for various what-if testing. Newer forecasting products also offer more detailed demographic forecast data including population change by race and ethnicity. This data will help to better understand regional population and job growth changes in the Regional Transportation Plan.

The estimated cost of this data is between \$40,000 and \$60,000. Contract authorization for this data purchase is not to exceed \$60,000.

#### IN BRIEF

Seven agencies submitted eleven projects this month for routine amendment into the Regional TIP. The projects are summarized in Exhibit A. These projects were awarded local, state, and federal funding through various funding processes, such as the Connecting Washington funds managed by the Washington State Department of Transportation. PSRC staff reviewed the projects for compliance with federal and state requirements, and consistency with VISION 2050 and the Regional Transportation Plan. At its meeting October 12, the Transportation Policy Board recommended adoption of the amendment

#### RECOMMENDED ACTION

The Executive Board should adopt an amendment to the 2023-2026 Regional TIP to include the projects as shown in Exhibit A.

#### **DISCUSSION**

Under the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA), PSRC has project selection authority for all projects programming regional funds from the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) - Surface Transportation Block Grant Program (STBG) and Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement Program (CMAQ) - and Federal Transit Administration (FTA) - Urbanized Area Formula Program (5307), State of Good Repair (5337), and Bus and Bus Facilities Formula (5339).

While PSRC does not have project selection authority for other types of federal, state, or local funds, the Executive Board does have responsibility for adding these projects to the Regional TIP. Each project must comply with requirements regarding plan consistency, air quality, and financial constraint. The attached Exhibit A illustrates the action needed to amend the Regional TIP.

The recommended action would approve the TIP amendment request based on a finding of consistency with VISION 2050, the Regional Transportation Plan, and the air quality conformity determination of the Regional TIP. Approval is also based on a determination that funding is reasonably expected to be available to carry out the project. Information describing plan consistency, air quality conformity, and the funding basis for approving the request is further described below.

### Consistency with VISION 2050 and the Regional Transportation Plan

The projects recommended for action were reviewed by PSRC staff and have been determined to be consistent with the multicounty policies in VISION 2050 and the Regional Transportation Plan.

# **Air Quality Conformity**

for Two Projects

#### IN BRIEF

Two agencies have submitted two requests to change the status of Regional Capacity Projects. Per PSRC's adopted procedures, requests to change a project status require Board action. At its meeting October 12, the Transportation Policy Board recommended that the Executive Board authorize changing the status of the projects as requested.

#### RECOMMENDED ACTION

The Executive Board should authorize the changes in project status for the two Regional Capacity Projects detailed in Exhibit A, from "Candidate" to "Approved."

#### **DISCUSSION**

The Regional Transportation Plan contains policies requiring PSRC's Executive Board to approve regionally significant transportation capacity projects before those projects begin implementation phases. Projects in the Regional Transportation Plan are designated as Candidate, Approved, or Conditionally Approved. A Candidate designation means a project has gone through a comprehensive planning process, but that one or more of the following has not yet been completed: environmental documentation and approvals, financial plan, and/or other planning requirements. A project's status is changed to Approved once these requirements have been met. Conditional Approval may be granted if a project has fulfilled most of the approval criteria but lacks only certain details. For example, if a project awaits only final signatures on its environmental documentation but has completed all other requirements, the Executive Board may grant Conditional Approval. Once the final details have been

completed, staff has the authority to grant a project full Approval status administratively, thereby saving the project sponsor several weeks of delay.

Two projects are requesting change in project status changes from "Candidate" to "Approved." Additional details of each project are provided in Exhibit A, including the project description and criteria applied to review the project for the requested status change.

#### IN BRIEF

PSRC recently conducted competitive processes to award funds under two separate project selection processes: the Rural Town Centers and Corridors Program and the Transportation Alternatives Program. On September 14, 2023, the Transportation Policy Board authorized the release of projects recommended for funding under both programs for public review and comment, including a prioritized contingency list of projects should additional funds become available prior to the next selection processes. As of October 19, 2023, no comments had been received. At its meeting on October 12, the Transportation Policy Board recommended approval of the projects for funding.

#### RECOMMENDED ACTION

The Executive Board should approve Rural Town Centers and Corridors Program and Transportation Alternatives Program funding to the list of projects identified in Attachments A and B, along with the recommended prioritized lists of contingency projects.

#### **DISCUSSION**

### **Rural Town Centers and Corridors Program**

In 2003, PSRC established the Rural Town Centers and Corridors (RTCC) Program to assist rural communities in implementing town center and corridor improvements. PSRC's project selection process for Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) funding

has set aside an amount for this program since 2004, with competitions for the available funding in the subsequent year. The funding amount for the program has increased over time, and the 2023 process was funded at 10% of the regional portion of FHWA funds, which equaled approximately \$6.09 million of FFY 2025-2026 funds.

In May 2023, a call for projects was released by PSRC for all eligible sponsors. Consistent with procedures adopted in prior processes, the solicitation and screening of project applications included a two-stage collaborative effort with PSRC and each of the four countywide organizations. First, eligible projects were reviewed by each of the four countywide organizations, with up to three projects per forum identified to participate. Eight projects—three from Pierce County, two each from Pierce County and Snohomish County, and one from King County—were submitted for the regional competition.

PSRC staff conducted the technical evaluation and scoring of the eight applications based on the adopted project evaluation criteria. All project sponsors were invited to present their projects to PSRC staff and the RTCC Project Selection Committee, which consisted of representatives from each of the four counties plus the Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) on August 9, 2023. The committee met on August 22, 2023 to develop a recommended list of projects to receive the approximately \$6.09 million available. At this meeting, the committee reviewed PSRC staff scores and details of the projects. In addition to project scores, the committee discussed other considerations in preparing its recommendation, which included geographic balance and scalability.

The committee voted unanimously on the recommended list of projects and contingency list, which are identified in Attachment A. The committee recommended full funding for the five top-scoring projects, and a partial award for a sixth project that was identified in consideration of geographic balance. The sponsor confirmed they can accept the reduced award amount and will backfill with local funding to ensure the phase is fully funded. The other two submitted projects are recommended for the contingency list, in rank order by score, should additional funds become available for this program prior to the next process.

### Transportation Alternatives Program

The Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) is a set-aside of FHWA funds under the federal transportation act that provides funding for community-based transportation improvements, such as pedestrian and bicycle facilities, historic preservation of transportation assets, environmental mitigation, and others. Metropolitan Planning Organizations such as PSRC have a role in the selection of projects to receive funding from the TAP within each region. In June 2023, a call for projects was released by PSRC to all eligible applicants for the \$23.6 million of FFY 2024-2026 funds available. Sponsors submitted a total of 31 project applications, requesting approximately \$45 million.

PSRC staff scored the applications based on the adopted project evaluation criteria. The TAP recommendation committee then met on August 24, 2023, to develop a recommended list of projects to receive the \$23.6 million available. The committee consisted of representatives from each of the four counties and one representative from PSRC's Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee. The committee's recommended list of twenty projects is identified in Attachment B, including a prioritized contingency list of the remaining projects should additional funding become available prior to the next process.

## **Summary of Public Comment**

On September 14, 2023, the Transportation Policy Board authorized the release of recommended projects from both competitions for public review and comment. A news release was sent to PSRC's media list of 144 contacts and was shared on four social media platforms. The public comment period was also featured in the Executive Director's newsletter, which is sent to 3,694 contacts comprised of PSRC's boards and committees, stakeholder groups and interested parties. Materials were also posted on PSRC's website, which invited the public to comment by mail or email. PSRC responds to every comment submitted, and comments regarding specific projects are also forwarded to the appropriate project sponsor for additional response.

As of October 19, 2023, no comments had been received. Any comments received by the October 26 Executive Board meeting will be provided at that time.

**Subject: Preparing for the 2024 Project Selection Process** 

#### **IN BRIEF**

PSRC has project selection authority for several sources of funds from both the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and Federal Transit Administration (FTA). Prior to each funding cycle, the policies and procedures for the project selection process are reviewed and updated as needed to reflect current regional priorities and requirements and are documented in the *Policy Framework for PSRC's Federal Funds*. The next process will be conducted in 2024 for PSRC's 2027-2028 FHWA and FTA funds.

The Transportation Policy Board has begun discussions to prepare for the 2024 project selection process and will continue over the next several months, with a specific emphasis on the policy focus areas of safety, climate and equity. The Executive Board will have an opportunity to provide feedback at their October 26 meeting and will be asked to review and adopt the updated *Policy Framework* at their meeting in January 2024.

#### DISCUSSION

A competitive project selection process is conducted every two to three years for the distribution of PSRC's federal funds. The next process will be conducted in 2024 for PSRC's 2027-2028 FHWA and FTA funds. Prior to each process a Policy Framework is adopted, outlining the policy guidance for the distribution of funds and other details on how the process will be conducted.

Safety, equity and climate are priority themes in both the Regional Transportation Plan and PSRC's funding processes. At the July meeting, the board was briefed on the work being conducted under the direction of the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) related to

these policy areas, and the attachments illustrate how they are addressed in the current project evaluation criteria for PSRC's funding competitions. The board was also reminded of the Equity Pilot currently underway in collaboration with PSRC's Equity Advisory Committee, recommendations from which will be finalized later this fall.

Discussions to prepare for the 2024 project selection process will continue over the next several months with the Transportation Policy Board, culminating in a recommendation on the Policy Framework in January 2024. Additional information will be provided at the October meeting to support these discussions, including: background on the project evaluation criteria, information on the projects funded in the last cycle, administrative details of the project selection process, and key policy questions related to safety, climate and equity.



Of the 50 applicable projects (excluding preservation, transit, TDM, etc.), 49 include one or more proven safety countermeasures, such as:

- Walkways, bicycle lanes and lighting
- Roundabouts and other reductions of left turn conflicts at intersections
- Crosswalk visibility enhancements and rectangular rapid flashing beacons
- Medians, pedestrian refuge islands

## Of the 8 projects providing general purpose lane capacity:

- Auburn, East Valley Highway Widening: fills a gap along a freight and transit corridor connecting a regional growth center and a manufacturing/industrial center; separates modes, includes intersection improvements, access control (1.1 mile project)
- Bothell, Bothell Way NE Multimodal Improvements, Phases 1-3: fills a gap along a transit corridor serving two regional growth centers; separates modes, includes intersection improvements, access control (1.3 mile project)
- Kitsap County, Ridgetop, Mickleberry to Myhre: fills a gap along a corridor within a regional growth center; separates modes, includes intersection improvements (0.4 mile project)
- Lynnwood, 42nd Avenue West Improvements: completes a new grid street in the heart of a regional growth center, providing multimodal access to the transit center (1/4 mile project)
- Poulsbo, Noll Road Improvements Segment North 3B: part of a corridor-wide improvement within the local town center on what is currently a gravel road; separates modes (1/4 mile project)
- WSDOT, SR 167 Completion Stage 2: completes final segment of major highway and freight corridor connecting to a regional growth center and a manufacturing/industrial center; includes a missing link in trail system, interchanges and variable tolls to manage traffic flow (4-mile project)

Subject: Federal Legislative Update

#### **IN BRIEF**

PSRC's federal consultants Leslie Pollner and Lauri Hettinger, Senior Policy Advisors from Holland & Knight, will provide a timely update on federal policy, funding and legislative efforts in Washington DC.

#### DISCUSSION

PSRC began working with Holland & Knight (H&K) in December of 2022 with a two-year contract approved by the Executive Board. H&K provides PSRC with advice, expert information and relationship building support on federal affairs, legislation and programs. The law firm has expertise and capacity to provide in-depth analysis of federal legislation and provide updates on federal programs and funding opportunities, adding capacity for PSRC staff. H&K is also facilitating deepened relationship building with members of the federal delegation and staff and federal agency staff. PSRC staff meets with H&K weekly to remain up to date on what is happening in Washington DC.

# **Biographies**

#### Leslie I. Pollner, Senior Policy Advisor

<u>Leslie Pollner</u> is co-leader of Holland & Knight's Local Government Group and a member of the firm's Public Policy & Regulation Group. Ms. Pollner focuses on several
