Sarah Gutschow, PSRC, provided an overview of the 2025-2026 FTA Equity Formula and Earned Share funding distributions, along with background information on how the process for awarding FTA funds for the Seattle-Tacoma-Everett UZA has changed. This is the first FTA Equity Formula funding distribution. Sarah and Kelly McGourty facilitated a discussion about projects submitted for the FTA Equity Formula and potential use of the funds for preservation and maintenance activities, and the circumstances under which those activities would be appropriate use for those funds. The TOC had a robust discussion about the proposed projects and recommended the

project list to the Transportation Policy Board (TPB). The TOC voted unanimously to forward the list of projects to the TPB.

**SUBJECT:** Regional Mobility On Demand Work Plan and Inventory

The committee will be provided with an overview of PSRC's Mobility On Demand (MOD) work program, including the development of a glossary and plans to conduct a regional MOD inventory survey. Staff will seek feedback from TOC on transit-related elements.

#### DISCUSSION

PSRC has created an MOD work program based on direction from the Regional Transportation Plan to collect data and analyze the performance of MOD in the region.

The work program begins with a review of existing studies and resources to identify the most commonly used terminology related to MOD and define the terms to be clear and consistent. This initial task will inform the next step, which is to conduct a regional MOD inventory to analyze trends and identify the needs and opportunities related to the current MOD programs in the region.

At the November meeting, PSRC staff will provide an overview of the work program and the draft MOD Glossary (Attachment A), which has been created to ensure there is clear and consistent usage of the terminology.

Staff will be seeking input on the following items:

- Does the glossary include all pertinent MOD-related concepts? If not, what do you think is missing?
- What is the full scope of Microtransit services and what type of information should we request from MOD-providers?
- Any other thoughts about the survey, inventory or MOD work program more broadly?

#### **NEXT STEPS**

PSRC is planning to conduct a regional MOD inventory to collect data from jurisdictions, transit agencies, and other relevant agencies in early 2024. PSRC will continue to provide briefings over the coming months to share the status of this work.

## **PSRC Mobility On Demand Glossary (DRAFT)**

#### **Overview**

Mobility On demand (MOD), also referred to as Shared Mobility, offers accessible transportation options on an as-needed basis rather than a fixed schedule. MOD includes concepts such as ridehailing, micromobility, carsharing, microtransit, and others. It provides users with personalized mobility options upon request, based on service areas determined by providers. While many MOD services are open to the general public, not all riders can access these services due to their age, income, ability, or other reasons. Pricing for MOD services is either fixed or based on supply and demand.

## **Glossary**

The glossary categorizes and describes a variety of MOD-related terms based on the review of recent studies and resources. The glossary is intended to be used as a resource to help guide local planning and encourage more consistent terminology and data collection across the region. PSRC staff has collected information from various sources and put together the table below, which also includes "Potential Measures." These are measures that could potentially be used to estimate the usage and other aspects related to these services.

SUBJECT: Update on Connecting People to Transit Project

#### **IN BRIEF**

The committee will be provided with an informational update on PSRC's transit access work program progress to-date, including preliminary feedback on the case study.

#### DISCUSSION

At past committee meetings, PSRC staff shared the work program developed from the Regional Transportation Plan's call to "...develop and update tools and resources to help identify where access to transit can be improved, particularly for bicyclists and pedestrians."

The work program starts with a review of existing transit access tools and resources in conjunction with updated data to help identify potential improvements to transit access assessments and next steps. This initial task began with a review of existing tools, such as the PSRC Transit Access Checklist and Transit Access Toolkit, found on the PSRC Transit Access webpage. These work products were the result of a multi-year effort to examine transit access needs in the region, published in 2016-2017.

At the November meeting, staff will provide an update on the transit access case studies to-date at select locations. The ad-hoc Transit Access Working Group identified five locations to test existing transit access tools, resources, and data:

- Wheaton Way Transit Center in Bremerton.
- Pacific Avenue and S 72<sup>nd</sup> Street in Tacoma.
- Tukwila International Boulevard Station Link light rail station in Tukwila
- Future Judkins Park Link light rail station in Seattle.
- Future Mariner Link light rail station in unincorporated Snohomish County (near the existing Mariner Park & Ride).

Staff is in the process of conducting high-level case studies to assess existing tools at these locations while collaborating with local jurisdiction and transit agency staff, as envisioned in the development of the existing tools. PSRC will share observations and

some preliminary findings with the committee at its November meeting. TOC will be asked to provide feedback in advance of a final report with recommendations for next steps, anticipated in early 2024.

#### **NEXT STEPS**

Over the next few weeks, PSRC will continue to complete case studies to test existing transit access tools, resources, and data. The next working group meeting is scheduled for December 1, 2023. Staff will solicit their input and consolidate findings and recommendations. PSRC will share the results of this task, anticipated in January 2024.
