## 2024 Comprehensive Plan Review Status

Fifty-five out of the 86 local jurisdictions have provided their draft local comprehensive plans for review and 48 comment letters have been sent. While some jurisdictions are expressing concern about meeting the December deadline, this rate is ahead of where the region was for the 2015 update cycle. Highlights we've seen in plans include community engagement techniques, like youth councils and community events, addressing racially disparate impacts and barriers to affordable housing, rezoning to accommodate housing needs, and climate work. ## **Collaborative Planning with Tribes**

The board continued their discussion of Tribal planning and coordination and staff from the Puyallup Tribe shared information from their comprehensive land use plan and suggestions for working with the Tribes. The Puyallup Tribe and other Tribes are interested in collaborating with jurisdictions on their comprehensive plans. Passed during the 2022 legislative session, HB 1717 facilitates Tribal participation in local planning under the Growth Management Act. Tribes typically want to collaborate on transportation, environmental, economic development and infrastructure planning. Board members are encouraged to consider their jurisdiction's approach to coordination with Tribes and share the Tribal coordination guidance document with their staff. View presentation.

**Subject: Regional Safety Action Plan Development** 

#### **IN BRIEF**

Work to develop PSRC's first Regional Safety Action Plan is continuing to advance, funded through the USDOT Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) Grant Program. The Equity Advisory Committed received a briefing on the initial data findings and engagement strategy at the July meeting. At the November meeting, the EAC will be briefed on key findings and the preliminary menu of tools and strategies developed for the plan. There will also be a summary of ongoing engagement to date, followed by a facilitated discussion by our consultant partners regarding safety concerns in our communities.

#### DISCUSSION

The current Regional Transportation Plan directs PSRC to develop a Regional Safety Action Plan including actions, targets and performance indicators. It also directs PSRC to seek resources for regional and local planning and projects and to use the Regional Safety Action Plan to help inform future regional and local planning.

In the last year, PSRC was awarded two planning grants through the USDOT Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) program, newly established through the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law of 2021. Totaling nearly \$8 million, these grants are funding the development of a Regional Safety Action Plan, as well as subawards to 15 local jurisdictions in the region – large and small – to develop roadway safety action plans tailored to their local needs.

Responding to the feedback heard at a June 2023 Regional Safety Summit, as well as the components required by USDOT under the provisions of the SS4A planning grant,

PSRC developed a draft scope of work for a Regional Safety Action Plan. To assist in this work, PSRC has contracted with several consultant partners to complete technical analysis and engagement.

In August 2024, PSRC launched the <u>RSAP Engagement Hub</u>, which provides information to stakeholders and the general public on how they can participate in the development of the plan (including an online survey). The Hub also features key findings and a detailed <u>State of the Region Report</u> based on the data analysis, as well as an <u>interactive map of the region's high-injury network</u>. This network highlights corridors across the region that have seen the highest concentrations of deaths and serious injuries in recent years.

At the November 7 meeting, PSRC staff will brief the EAC on the key findings and emphasis areas derived from the data analysis, the preliminary menu of tools and strategies being developed for the plan, and provide a summary of what has been heard through the engagement process so far. Following this briefing, representatives from our consultant team will lead a facilitated focus group discussion to gather detailed feedback from the EAC about safety concerns they see in their own communities.

Questions for the Equity Advisory Committee:

- What would an ideal, safe, and accessible commute look like?
- What specific changes would make your commute feel easier and safer?
- What safety features do you wish your community had?"
  - Are there tools, technologies, or supports that would enhance your experience?

#### **NEXT STEPS**

Feedback provided by the EAC will help inform next steps in the development of the Regional Safety Action Plan. An additional briefing will be provided to the EAC in early 2025 when a draft plan is developed. The plan is scheduled to be adopted in spring of 2025.
