Methodology

- King, Snohomish, Pierce, and Kitsap County Residents
- Conducted March 3-12, 2025, in English/Spanish
- Mixed land/mobile telephone and email/web methodology
- 2,000 interviews; overall margin of error +/- 2.8
 - King: n=750
 - Pierce: n=500
 - Snohomish: n=450
 - Kitsap: n=300



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Key Takeaways

- Residents are concerned about road safety. Improving safety for road users is a priority across the region – especially for drivers, but also for pedestrians and bicyclists.
- Residents tend to see other drivers' behaviors as a bigger contributor to safety problems than lack of safety infrastructure.
- That said, most support changes to the built environment when connected to how those changes can alter driver behaviors and build safer driving into the system.
- Traffic congestion, public transit, road maintenance are dominant concerns in region when it comes to transportation.





Road Safety Perceptions

Biggest Regional Road Safety Concern



Over a third of residents mention other drivers' behavior as their biggest concern when it comes to regional road safety.

Around one-in-six mention road conditions.

When you think about all other trips you make around the greater Puget Sound region, what is your biggest concern when it comes to safety on our roads?




41% are about drivers or bad driving behavior

Regional concerns are fairly similar across counties. Speeding and Street racing is a bit more of a concern to Kitsap and Pierce residents.





Road Safety Problems




About 70% of residents say distracted driving and drivers looking at their phones are problems, and about a third say speeding and lack of enforcement for unsafe driving are very big problems.



Perceived Safety




Across modes, residents tend to feel safest moving around residential streets. Majorities feel unsafe walking or bicycling along or crossing major roadways.



Perceived Walking Safety by County




Only about a quarter of Pierce, Snohomish, and Kitsap residents say they feel very safe walking along residential streets in their neighborhoods, and about one-in-ten feel very safe walking along major roadways.



Perceived Biking Safety by County



Outside of King County, less than half of residents say they feel safe bicycling along residential streets.



Road Safety Investment Priorities




Residents are open to changing the built environment. A third strongly agree we need to spend money on changing transportation infrastructure and 7-in-10 overall agree. They also see a need for more education and enforcement.

We need to spend money on changing our transportation infrastructure so that additional safety measures are built into the transportation system automatically, instead of relying on drivers, bicyclists, and pedestrians to behave.

We need more persuasive public messaging and required driver education courses to encourage and change behaviors on the road.

We need to spend more time and money on law enforcement officers patrolling and enforcing the rules of the road, like ticketing drivers who speed, drive distracted, or break the law.

We need more tools to enforce good behavior on the roads, like red-light cameras and speed cameras that issue tickets so that drivers face financial penalties and change their behavior.






Transportation Priorities

Traffic and public transportation issues top the list of transportation problems in Puget Sound, with over a quarter of residents mentioning each.

Thinking about all of the ways people get around Puget Sound, what do you think is the most important <u>transportation</u> problem facing the Puget Sound region today?






Q2. Thinking about all of the ways people get around Puget Sound, what do you think is the most important <u>transportation</u> problem facing the Puget Sound region today?

Reliable, well-maintained roads and highways and reduced traffic across the region are the top two priorities for residents across Puget Sound.


