## **CALL TO ORDER AND ROLL CALL**

The meeting was called to order at 9:32 a.m. by Mayor Dana Ralph, Chair. Chair Ralph stated that a video of the meeting would be streamed live as well as recorded. The video would be available for viewing on PSRC's website. A call-in number was provided on the meeting agenda for members of the public to call in by phone and listen to the meeting live.

Roll call determined attendance and that a quorum was present.

### COMMUNICATIONS AND PUBLIC COMMENT

There was no public comment provided.

### REPORT OF THE CHAIR

Mayor Ralph welcomed Vice Chair Mayor Rob Putaansuu, joining in person.

## **DIRECTOR'S REPORT**

Kelly McGourty, PSRC, reminded the board of the briefings provided over the last three months on the current transportation system and how this information will feed into discussions of the future transportation system and the financial strategy for the draft Regional Transportation Plan. Between May and July, the board will discuss available revenues and proposed expenditures for the draft plan, culminating in direction to staff in July on one or more scenarios to move ahead into modeling and analysis. Ms. McGourty also reminded the board that the TPB Transit Caucus meetings are now being held the Monday before the TPB meeting, for board members who also serve on transit boards.

<u>ACTION</u>: The motion was made and seconded (Putaansuu/Barón) to adopt the Consent Agenda. The motion passed.

### **DISCUSSION ITEM: LEGISLATIVE UPDATE**

Robin Koskey, PSRC, reported on federal updates and activity, including discussions surrounding reauthorization of the federal transportation act. She also reported that the fiscal year 2025 notice of funding opportunity under the federal Safe Streets and Roads for All grant program has been released. Ms. Koskey then provided information on the state legislative session, noting key bills and upcoming cutoff dates. She described the draft operating and transportation budget proposals from the House and Senate. Ms. Koskey shared that the PSRC Executive Board adopted a resolution at their March meeting in support of sustainable transportation revenue. She then briefly discussed various bills related to a variety of transportation-related topics.

# ACTION ITEM: 2025 PROJECT TRACKING: EXTENSION REQUESTS AND CONTINGENCY FUNDING

Kalon Thomas, PSRC, reminded the board of the purpose of PSRC's adopted project tracking policies, to ensure efficient and timely project delivery which minimizes the cost of delays and preserves federal funds coming to the region. These policies address the need to meet annual delivery targets for PSRC's Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) funds by setting firm obligation deadlines but allow sponsors to request up to a one-year extension under certain parameters. These extensions create a gap in each fiscal year's delivery and require approval by PSRC's boards. Mr. Thomas confirmed that the 2025 project extension requests have been reviewed by PSRC staff in collaboration with the Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) and the chairs of the Regional Project Evaluation Committee (RPEC) and the four countywide transportation forums for consistency with the adopted project tracking policies prior to being presented to the board. Seventeen extensions are recommended for approval. One extension requested by the City of Seattle was determined to not meet the adopted policies. The city subsequently withdrew the request and will return the funds and is eligible to recompete in future grant competitions.

Councilmember Saka requested reconsideration of the Seattle project and to postpone action on the extension request until the May board meeting. The motion was made and seconded. (Saka/Kettle)

<u>ACTION:</u> The motion was made and seconded (Daughtry/Walker) to recommend the Executive Board approve the remaining 2025 project extension requests. The motion passed.

Jennifer Barnes, PSRC, reminded the board that federal funds which are voluntarily returned or de-obligated prior to the annual delivery rebalancing period may be awarded to projects on the current contingency list. Ms. Barnes noted that the returned funds are only awarded to contingency projects within the same project category as the original award and are offered in ranked priority order. When accepted, the funds must be obligated within the same fiscal year. She reported that three contingency projects are able to accept \$2.2 million of the \$13.2 million in available 2025 returned funds. Ms. Barnes noted that the remaining \$11 million of returned funds was included in the supplemental funding action approved during the March meeting to fill the gap in achieving the 2025 annual delivery target.

<u>ACTION:</u> The motion was made and seconded (Putaansuu/Barón) to recommend the Executive Board award \$2.2 million of returned funds to the contingency list projects. The motion passed.

## **ACTION ITEM: REGIONAL SAFETY ACTION PLAN RECOMMENDATION**

Ben Bakkenta, PSRC, summarized the public comments received on the draft Regional Safety Action Plan that were reviewed with the board in March. Comments were delineated and categorized by topic and noted as being either general plan comments requiring no further action, technical corrections or clarifications, or comments requiring board review. PSRC staff provided the board with an updated document identifying the staff response to each comment and specific proposed edits to the draft plan. Mr. Bakkenta summarized the proposed technical corrections and then reviewed in more detail the proposed edits identified for board review.

Mr. Bakkenta reviewed the grouping of comments for board review and the PSRC staff proposed edits to the plan. These include: 1) calls for future PSRC work related to driver behavior and education, speeding and enforcement and ongoing monitoring, guidance and best practices; 2) recognizing local and state planning and high injury networks in the plan; 3) recognizing issues with impairment data and the potential for underreporting; 4) acknowledging the unique needs of freight corridors and areas when applying safety strategies; and 5) incorporating state, regional and local high injury networks and safety planning into PSRC's project selection process and the Regional Transportation Plan.

The Transportation Policy Board was asked to recommend adoption of the Regional Safety Action Plan to the Executive Board, with final adoption scheduled at the General Assembly on May 22.

<u>ACTION:</u> The motion was made and seconded (Walker/Mayhew) to recommend adoption of the Regional Safety Action Plan to the Executive Board, including the proposed technical corrections and revisions. The motion passed.

# DISCUSSION ITEM: REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION PLAN DEVELOPMENT: CURRENT TRANSPORTATION SYSTEM

Miles Stepleton, PSRC, described the regionwide data collection process PSRC conducted to quantify the maintenance, preservation and operations needs for the RTP. The data has shown that costs are rising and needs are increasing. Mr. Stepleton then described the available data and key trends for various categories of assets, including city and county roads, state highways, bridges, culverts, transit and ferries. He also referenced other assets with increased maintenance and preservation costs such as stormwater facilities, bicycle/pedestrian infrastructure and traffic control technology. Mr. Stepleton concluded by noting that costs associated with maintenance and preservation continue to increase throughout the region and that expenditures do not match the increasing needs. He reminded the board that the RTP financial strategy has historically assumed that the backlog of the region's maintenance and preservation needs are met, and the system is maintained and operated in a state of good repair through the life of the plan.

Members had questions related to available revenue sources for maintenance and preservation and impacts to the system if needs are not fully met.
