# Ped/bike section of the current system report

1. Introduction and Overview of the Household Travel Survey
2. Overview of Ped/Bike Facilities
  - Facility Coverage
  - Bicycle Facility Types
  - Regional Shared Use Paths
3. Analysis of the Ped/Bike Inventory
  - Coverage in Safety Focus Areas, different densities, EFAs
  - Level of Traffic Stress and Facility Gap Analysis





# Facility Inventory in the Visualization Tool



An updated Transportation Visualization Map is being developed

The Map will show:

- Presence of ped/bike facilities
- Bicycle facility type
- Bicycle level of traffic stress
- Other transportation Facilities and geographies



# Ped/Bike Elements of the Future System

Future conditions information includes:

- **Regional capacity stand-alone ped/bike projects**
  - NOTE: these must meet thresholds discussed earlier in year
  - Example: New segments of Eastrail trail corridor
- **Other Regional capacity projects** that include ped/bike components in them
  - Examples would be road or transit projects that incorporate ped/bike elements
- **Assumptions relating to programmatic investments** (e.g., sidewalk projects, etc.)
- **Model outputs**



# Elements of the analysis and plan outcomes



- Regional Transit Access assessment – new for 2026 Plan
  - Includes an “urban form” component addressing walk, bike, roll; and TOD among other things
- RTP Outputs:
  - Proximity to transit with (today vs future)
  - Modeling outputs, such as future walk/bike trips; walk access to transit, etc.
  - RTP Dashboard highlight for current RTP: 21% more walking and biking by 2050
- Strategies for achieving the goals
