Equity Advisory Committee Meeting Summary

Welcome

Shannon Turner, from Kitsap County, and Julia Jannon-Shields, from King County, called the meeting to order at 5:30 pm. The co-chairs welcomed everyone and asked Mikayla to begin the roll call for attendance.

Shannon invited the committee to the Kitsap Juneteenth Block Party, a celebration on June 19 from 1-5 pm at The Village, in Bremerton. Michelle encouraged all EAC members to attend the PSRC General Assembly, on May 22, both to connect with other members and to learn more about PSRC's work across the agency.

Staff Announcements

Charles reminded EAC members to submit responses to the EAC Member Annual Survey, which includes questions about their experience on the committee and if they would like to continue serving.

Charles and EAC representatives briefed the committee on the work of the Growth Management Policy Board and Transportation Policy Board.

Discussion Item: Regional Transportation Plan and Coordinated Mobility Plan PSRC has been gathering information on the current transportation system to support the development of the next long-range Regional Transportation Plan. Staff provided briefings to the EAC in June 2024 and February 2025. A status of current and upcoming

work was provided at the May meeting, with a particular focus on upcoming outreach and engagement opportunities.

Accessibility and Equity in Transit Spaces

- Were centers for independent living consulted?
- Concern over app-based requests for paratransit as not all community members have smart phones.
- Not enough transportation on Sundays, for after-school activities, and for older community members.
- Lack of accessibility and amenities for people with disabilities. One example is King Street Station, which is often in a state of disrepair/elevators out of service.
- The region is rapidly expanding service with new technology, but not thoughtfully considering innovative ways of creating accessible spaces for the transportation needs of people with disabilities.
- When routes are canceled, instructions for alternative options are typically written, which isn't helpful for people with vision-related disabilities
- Grade issues are not always considered, i.e. a .5 mile walk uphill is much more difficult and time-consuming than a flat distance.
- Concern for over-policing of transit riders of color.

Outreach Improvements

- Awareness during outreach opportunities of the current political climate, and how folks may feel uncomfortable engaging with government staff.
- Circle back to community members who share feedback and demonstrate how feedback is incorporated. Allow folks to opt-in to build a relationship with the agency.

A New Missing Middle? The Disappearance of Moderate Sized Housing

Transfer of Development Rights Workshop

The board was briefed on WA Department of Commerce's workshop that will help jurisdictions develop and update Transfer of Development Rights (TDR) programs and Land Conservation and Local Infrastructure Programs (LCLIP). TDR is a market-based mechanism that supports voluntary transfer of development rights from areas where developing is discouraged, and moved to places the community would like to grow. LCLIP provides a financial incentive for eligible cities in King, Pierce and Snohomish counties to participate in TDR. The workshop is planned for June 11 to go over the guidance resources and answer questions. View presentation.

Subject: Addressing Racially Disparate Impacts in Comprehensive Plans

IN BRIEF

Members of the University of Washington Evans School Consulting Lab team will share their report on addressing racially disparate impacts in comprehensive plans with the committee. The team is interested in feedback on the report, hearing about racially disparate impacts in local communities, and help identifying research topics for future teams.

DISCUSSION

PSRC's housing work program includes a range of strategies and tools to help local governments address the need for housing in their communities.

Amendments to the Growth Management Act by House Bill 1220 emphasized the need for local comprehensive plans to address housing for households of all incomes and require plans to address racially disparate impacts, exclusion, and displacement. With the recent requirement to update comprehensive plans, the region has seen the first wave of comprehensive plans addressing these topics, giving us a unique view into how housing policy is evolving.

The University of Washington Evans School operates a Student Consulting Lab where small teams of Evans School Master of Public Administration students investigate policy and organizational problems. PSRC contracted with the Evans School to have a consulting team evaluate how comprehensive plans were meeting these new requirements and explore what we could learn from them. The Evans team started work in January. Team members include:

Project Description

The consultants will conduct a case study of local communities that have developed policies to address economic displacement, as mandated in HB 1220 (2021 - "An act relating to supporting emergency shelters and housing through local planning and development regulations"). In addition, consultants will evaluate HB 1220's incorporation into municipalities' comprehensive plans through the lens of racially disparate impacts, displacement, and exclusion. Consultants will interface directly with communities around the region to identify how municipalities incorporate HB 1220's requirements and inform PSRC of policy-making strategies that can guide future municipal housing policy.

This builds on an Evans consulting project with Tacoma last year that looked at antidisplacement strategies and may set a foundation for additional analysis in the future.

The Evans Team will present their report to the committee and seek to discuss how local communities are addressing racially disparate impacts. The final report will be published in June.


