

Freight Advisory Committee Meeting Summary

Date: April 9, 2025, 9:30a.m. - 11:00a.m.

Welcome and Introductions

Doug Cox, PSRC, welcomed everyone at 9:30 a.m. Roll call was completed to confirm the members and alternates present.

Action: Approval of Meeting Summary

The February 12, 2024, meeting summary was approved as presented.

Discussion: Integrating Community Considerations in Freight Investments

Brandy DeLange, FMSIB, discussed FMSIB's emphasis on improving freight mobility while minimizing community impacts. When applying to FMSIB's 6-year investment program, project sponsors should demonstrate factors including sufficient engagement with overburdened communities. Thirty-four (34) projects were submitted to the most recent 6-year investment program. FMSIB will continue to update and refine the program through ongoing stakeholder engagement.

Fred Wenhardt, FMSIB, provided an overview of the mapping tools and worksheets developed with BERK Consulting and Cascadia Consulting Group. The tools are not required for application to FMSIB's 6-year investment program but can help applicants and project sponsors integrate consideration of overburdened communities in freight investments. Additionally, FMSIB shared a survey with previous applicants of the 6-year investment program which will help improve the process in anticipation of FMSIB's 2026 call for projects.

Discussion: Safety Strategies for Freight Corridors

Geri Poor, Port of Seattle, and Ryan Medlen, Port of Tacoma, shared three examples of safety strategies for freight corridors. FAST Corridor was an early comprehensive freight effort that linked the ports of Everett, Seattle, and Tacoma with other partners to fill safety gaps along a major rail corridor. The speakers then compared the safety improvements for East and West Marginal Way, noting differences in the stakeholder engagement processes and resulting bike facilities. The safety improvement process for

East Marginal Way was generally more collaborative and will result in a fully separate, two-way protected bike lane. The final example shared was educating roadway users through safety videos. The presentation linked three videos that cover safety tips for cyclists and truck drivers.

David Paine, City of Kent, shared about Kent's Safety Action Plan. The City's High Injury Network did not find vulnerable road users in Kent's MIC. Kent is also collaborating with rail partners and the Port Alliance on a rail crossing elimination study, expected to be released later this year.
