Continued population surge

Annual population change in the central Puget Sound,








350,000 increase over 6 years

Only 2nd time **80,000+ people added** to region in a single year since 1990-1991





People of color in the region

- Currently 35% of the population
- Represent 81% of the growth since 2000

Hispanics, with growth of 130% since 2000, now are **10% of the region's** population

People of color are more dispersed throughout the region




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


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


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
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


The region is getting older



By 2030, nearly **1 in 5** of the region's residents will be seniors, nearly double the share in 2000








A robust regional economy

Annual job change, 2010-2017





61,000 wage & salary jobs added to region last year (3.0% increase)

349,000 jobs added to region since 2010 (20% increase)

King and Snohomish counties have accounted for **86%** of job growth since 2010

Unemployment has dropped to 4%



A crisis in affordability




Roughly a 60% increase in home prices and apartment rents in past 5 years.



Lower income renter households are hit hardest






Travel times are increasing



2017 marked the 7th straight year of increased transit ridership

Light rail boardings **increased 66%** in the first 3 months of 2017 - a result of 3 additional stations

80% of the region's population will be within a 10 minute walk of transit in 2040




Species are struggling to recover

- Peak population of 98 Orcas in 1995
- 76 Orcas as of Sept 2017
- Orca population continues to decline associated with fewer salmon

Mixed bill of health for Puget Sound



Getting better



Mixed results



Examples:

- Marine bird population abundance
- Employment in natural resource agencies
- Contaminants in Pacific herring

Not improving or getting worse



Examples:

- The number of Southern Resident killer whales
- The condition of swimming beaches
- Chinook salmon population

Examples:

- Restoration of floodplains
- Acres of harvestable shellfish beds
- Area of estuarine wetlands restored to tidal flooding

Of the 29 measurable indicators of the health of Puget Sound, 10 have not improved or are getting worse since tracking began in 2007
